ARTISIAN WELLS ARE
VERY NUMEROUS IN
COUNTRY NEAR CANBY

CANBY, Ore., May 26.—Clackamas county can boast of having some of the most valuable artisan wells, and these are located near this city. One of these is on the J. E. Cooper farm near Barlow, one mile from Canby, having a depth of 74 feet; another is on the place of Roy Palmateer, one and one-fourth miles from Canby, and has a depth of 150 feet.

The last to be drilled was by Peter Hornig at a depth of 200 feet, and having an eight-inch opening. This is for the city of Aurora, which furnishes an artisan flow of 3900 gallons of water per hour, with a lift of water of 23 feet above the surface.

Besides those mentioned there are two artisan wells on the opposite side of the Willamette river, ranging from 100 to 200 feet in depth.

P. R. L. & P. FILES
PETITION FOR
CAR FARE RAISE

SALEM, May 26.—Pointing out that the voters of Portland had rejected the remedial measures recommended by the public service commission in its recent order, the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, in a petition filed with the state commission this morning, asks that "relief be now afforded by an adequate increase in fares."

In the petition the company further points out that traffic during the present year, instead of holding its own as had been expected, is showing a material decrease even with a continuation of the 6-cent fare. A table accompanying the petition shows a decrease in traffic revenues for the months of February, March and April, 1920, in excess of \$48,000 under that of the same period a year ago. At the same time, it is also pointed out, wages have been increased in several instances.

A forecast of the new rate which the commission will probably allow the company can be very safely based on the opinion of Commissioner H. H. Corey in the previous order which declared that a rate of 7 cents with an additional 1 cent for transfers was necessary to the successful maintenance of car service in Portland, except that the new conditions may justify an even higher rate, probably one of 8 cents.

CANBY HIGH WINS
FROM LOCAL BOYS IN
EXTRA INNING GAME

Canby high school demonstrated their superiority in baseball over Oregon City high Friday at Canemah field when they took the local boys into camp to the tune of 6 to 4 in a game that went 10 innings.

The game was considered one of the best ever played on local grounds and it was nobody's game until the finish. The score was tied 2 to 2, 3 to 3 and in the ninth 4 to 4. In the last inning the Canby boys run in two scores and clinched the game.

This makes the third game Oregon City has lost this season and the Canby team has a clean record, going the entire season without defeat and having the championship clinched.

Califf pitched a good game for Oregon City but walked several who made scores. Gribble pitched for Canby and both he and Califf went the entire distance. Up to the fatal tenth Califf held the Canbyites hitless and it was a hard game to lose. In this inning he walked one and allowed a scratch hit. PRESBYTERIANS ARE
ADVISED TO LEAVE
INTERCHURCH PLAN

PHILADELPHIA, May 25.—Recommendations were submitted today to the general assembly of the Presbyterian church of America by Dr. John Willis Baer of Pasadena, Cal., chairman of the executive committee, that it withdraw from the interchurch world movement.

The executive committee suggested that the assembly decline to incur any further financial obligation in reference to the interchurch world movement, that it terminate its relationship with the movement and withdraw representation.

The Presbyterian church, under the recommendations of the commission, will liquidate \$1,000,000 it underwrote of the interchurch world movement's financial program.

OLD BUILDING IS
BADLY DAMAGED
BY SERIOUS FIRE

What might have been a disastrous fire occurred in this city Wednesday morning about 8:30 o'clock, in the building owned by E. A. Brady, occupied as a second-hand store by Goldman & Son, and the second story furnished housekeeping rooms, sublet by "Hutch." The front room had been rented several days ago to a man by the name of W. H. Theyer, and the three rooms occupied by Mrs. M. D. Holford and four children Mrs. Holford, a widow, and her daughter, Henrietta, aged 17 years, are employed in the woolen mills, and had gone to their daily work when the fire broke out, leaving the children at home, as was the custom, in care of a daughter, Inez, a girl of 13 years.

The fire originated when Theyer attempted to light an oil stove, the new burner he had placed in the stove had failed to work, and the flames caught the curtains, soon spreading to the rooms. Theyer called to Inez Holford to assist him in extinguishing the flames. The girl made a heroic effort, and her little brother Guy, 12 years of age, rushed to a nearby pool room, and asked the men to turn in the fire alarm. He says the men failed to do so, and he then rushed to the barber shop of Walter Bennett in the Electric hotel building. Although Mr. Bennett was engaged at the time, he rushed to the telephone and gave the alarm, and hastened to the scene of the fire where he gave his assistance until the fire company arrived.

There was much excitement for time, after the alarm had been turned in for the fire bell was out of commission, due to a burned out generator. The telephone operators of the Pacific Telephone company were trying their best to get the alarm sounder, as the fire bell is sounded through the telephone office, and people were calling from various sections inquiring as to the location of the fire, while others were trying to "call down" operators as they vainly tried to give the alarm. At last some one called the Schoenborn store on Seventh and Center streets, a block from the fire bell tower, asking him to sound the alarm. Wendall Glutner, employed at the store, was on the job at once, and as Schoenborn handed him a hammer, Glutner rushed to the fire tower, scaled the steep ladder and commenced hammering the bell, which could be heard over the city. By this time the merchants on the street near the burning building were commencing to prepare to move to safe quarters as the flames were threatening the entire block. Schoenborn rushed to the Seventh street fire house and with the assistance of other firemen and helpers rushed down the hill, and by this time all companies had responded to the call. In trying to bring the hook and ladder truck from its headquarters at the rear of the Busch store the firemen had a difficult time.

In extinguishing the flames several of the firemen were injured. Among these was Gerald Warner, of the Fountain hose company, who had a nail run through his foot, and "Teck" Stovall, member of hook and ladder company had his face and hands badly burned by coming in contact with hot water pipes.

Great credit is given the fire companies of Oregon City for the excellent work they accomplished in extinguishing the fire, for the fire started in one of the most dangerous sections of the city, all of the buildings being old structures except one. The only means of escape of the building burned was over a roof on a narrow passage way.

A pitiful spectacle took place shortly after the fire, when little Guy Holford stood weeping, and told the bystanders that the photograph of a dead brother and all of his belongings that could not be replaced were destroyed. The boy, Orville, died in Baker two years ago.

The Holford family came to Oregon City five months ago, and they are now in destitute circumstances, and through the kindness of County Judge Anderson, the county is giving temporary relief, as is also the Red Cross. Any donations will be gladly received for relief, as is also the Red Cross. An effort is being made to secure furniture and clothing and start the little family into a home again.

The children are Henrietta, aged 17 years; Inez, 13 years; Guy, 12 years, and Ethel 8 years. A big hearted woman of this city gave the family a home for Wednesday evening, and the Hawley Pulp & Paper company are to give a number of fells for blankets. Mr. Hawley selecting his best fells for this relief work.

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Huge Sum of Gold
