

MEXICANS CAPTURE AMERICANS AT JIMINEZ

WASHINGTON, May 26.—Two Americans, Homer Carr and a man named Macdonald, have been taken prisoners at Jiminez, Chihuahua, according to a report today from the American consul at Chihuahua. No details were given.

MEXICO CITY, May 26.—Formal investigation for the purpose of clarifying the part taken in the death of President Carranza, both of Colonel Rodolfo Herrera and members of the Carranza party, is recommended by the commission of four named by General Obregon and Gonzales to inquire into the tragedy at Tlaxcalantongo.

INDIAN TROOPS ARE SENT AGAINST REDS IN BATUM DISTRICT

LONDON, May 26.—Bolshevik forces continue to pour into Persia and have occupied Reest, from which British troops have retired toward Teheran, says the Daily Sketch.

The newspaper declares Indian reinforcements have been landed at Batum, to be followed by other troops as soon as transportation is available. Reest, a villa on the right bank of the Dnieper river, approximately 125 miles north of Kiev, has been occupied by Russian Bolshevik forces, which are also advancing on the fortified outskirts of Bobruisk, on the Beresina river, according to an official statement from Moscow.

Attacks by Polish and Ukrainian troops southeast of Kiev, along the Kiev-Poltava railway, have been repulsed.

Along the upper reaches of the Beresina river soviet forces are said to have occupied a number of villages.

EXPERIMENT STATION IS FORCED TO CLOSE FOR LACK OF FUNDS

PENDLETON, May 26.—The government experiment station near Hermiston, established more than 10 years ago, is to be discontinued June 30, because of lack of funds. Federal aid comes from the Western irrigation and experiment station appropriations.

The state also pays a part. Congress has cut the appropriations, necessitating the closing of the Hermiston station and two others in the state. Harold K. Dean has been director of the station, and numerous ideas worked out there have been successful on the reclaimed lands of the irrigation districts and throughout the county.

STONE REELECTED
ASTORIA, May 26.—Byron F. Stone, chairman of the Port of Astoria commission, was reelected president of the board of directors of the Y. M. C. A. Secretary James Palmer, who resigned to accept the position of assistant general secretary in Portland, leaves for that city June 1.

GOVERNOR MAY RESIGN OFFICE OF SECRETARY

SALEM, Ore., May 21.—In the face of the returns from yesterday's primary election, which indicate that Sam A. Koser has been nominated for the office of secretary of state by a substantial lead over his six opponents, friends of Governor Olcott said today that the latter official probably would resign as head of the state department before June 1 and appoint as his successor the successful candidate in the Republican primary contest.

Since the death of Governor Withycombe in March, 1919, Mr. Olcott has held the offices of both governor and secretary of state. For the latter office, however, he has claimed no compensation.

It was said here today that the governor is extremely anxious that three persons shall compose the state board of control, and for that reason he is expected to retire from the state department within the next few days. This would make it possible for Mr. Koser to participate in the proceedings of the board of control at its meeting early in June.

BOSTON, Mass., May 26.—Judge Pierce in the supreme court here today declared dissolved the temporary injunction against the so-called "Harvey group," restraining them from interfering with the business of the Christian Science Publishing society.

MOTOR PARTY MEETS ACCIDENT AT WEST LINN

A motoring party composed of Mr. and Mrs. E. G. Johnson, of Willamette, Elmer Johnson, William McLarty, Mathew McLarty, of Bolton, and Joe Nixon, while on their way from Willamette to Bolton Sunday afternoon, went over a cliff of about 40 feet when the steering gear of their automobile failed to work as they were rounding a curve near the big water tank on the West Linn hill.

E. G. Johnson, an experienced driver was at the wheel, his machine going at a moderate speed, when the accident occurred. The machine pitched forward down among the brush and rocks. The other members of the party are only suffering from minor bruises and shock of going over the cliff.
