

CLIMAX IN THE ENTERPRISE'S BIG CAMPAIGN TO BE REACHED MONDAY

Most Valuable List of Prizes Ever Awarded In Clackamas County Will Be Distributed To The Winning Contestants in Four More Short Days.

The climax comes Monday night! Seven weeks of enthusiastic work and hustling on the part of the candidates in the Enterprise's big automobile contest will culminate in the closing scene, Monday night, June 21st, at 10 o'clock. The awards of the valuable prizes will be announced in Tuesday's Enterprise, if possible to complete the count in time.

The list of prizes includes a beautiful new \$2,450.00 Oldsmobile touring car now on display at Miller-Parker's salesrooms, five hundred dollars in gold, two \$200.00 prizes and two \$100.00 prizes. Absolute Fairness to All
In order to maintain the strictest secrecy as to the number of subscriptions turned in by each individual candidate during this, the last few days of the contest, the race is being brought to a close under a sealed ballot box.

No subscriptions whatever are being accepted through the campaign department this week, but instead final collections of the candidates are being placed in the locked and sealed ballot box—located at the Bank of Commerce, corner Eighth and Main Sts. By so doing, no one, not even the campaign manager, can possibly know the voting strength of the respective candidates, which precludes any possibility of favoritism and insures fairness to the minutest degree.

Locked and sealed, the ballot box is now in the Bank of Commerce, where it will remain until the closing hour of the contest—ten o'clock Monday night.

When the final hour arrives the contest will be declared closed. The judges will then break the seals, unlock the box, and immediately thereafter, or as soon as votes can be issued on subscriptions contained therein, the last count will begin.

Most Successful Campaign
And never before in this section of the state has there been such a successful subscription campaign. Each of the leading candidates has turned in hundreds of new as well as renewal subscriptions, and the enthusiasm of the contestants has been augmented by the hearty response the people have made to the solicitations of the contestants. The final week will give the total volume of the campaign a big boost.

Each contestant is now devoting every minute of their time to getting in all the votes possible before the closing hour, and the enthusiastic boosting of their friends is proving an important factor in the race. NIGHT COP ATTACKED BY YOUNG BIERMAN

That kindness does not always pay was the conclusion that Night Officer Surfus came to Saturday night when he arrested Raymond Bierman for drunkenness and afterwards took the young man home to get the consent of his mother that he would appear before Judge Loder Monday.

Officer Surfus first found the man staggering on Eighth street with a bottle of liquor in his pocket. The officer took the liquor from him and asked where he got it. This information was refused and Bierman was placed under arrest.

As they were nearing the jail Bierman told Surfus that his mother was ill and he did not want the arrest to be known. As Bierman did not have his money and Judge Loder could not be reached on the phone, Surfus loaded his prisoner in the city automobile and drove up the hill to find him. After Bierman talked to Loder the officer was informed that if the mother of the boy would give her promise to have him report Monday he would be given his release.

Again the car was started, this time for the Bierman home at Ellyville. When the home was reached it was found that Mrs. Bierman was at her daughter's home on Division street. After the place was reached the officer allowed the Bierman boy to go in to the house and talk to his mother, who came out to the car. Officer Surfus explained the trouble and showed her the bottle of booze, at the sight of which she fainted. The officer helped her into the house and a few minutes later she came out again. When the officer asked her to promise she would see to it that her son would not appear Monday she said she could not do so and started to faint again.

The officer then ordered the boy into the car, at which he flew into a rage and threatened to brain Surfus. He started reaching for something to do the deed with and Surfus grabbed him.

He put up a hard fight and struck the officer several times. In order to protect himself Surfus seized the boy by the neck. The whole family evidently thought the officer meant to kill the boy and his mother, sisters and a son-in-law rushed into the fray to aid the boy. Surfus had Bierman down when the bunch piled in and when the son-in-law caught the officer by the arm Surfus ordered him to break away or he would take a shot at him. With the threat the son-in-law ceased to be an active participant in the fight and released the officer.

In the fracas the officer was pushed through a large window and his face and clothing were damaged by flying glass. Surfus broke away from the boy's family and pulled his prisoner into the machine and brought him to jail. The son-in-law and Mrs. Bierman came to the jail with the officer and Loder was called. Mrs. Bierman promised to see that the boy appeared for trial Tuesday and he was released.

ROAD BONDS SOLD BY STATE BOARD FOR FIGURE BELOW P. A. R.

SALEM, Or., June 16.—The state board of control, at a special meeting here yesterday, disposed of \$1,500,000 of federal aid road bonds at \$7.62. The bonds were purchased by Henry Teal of Portland and the bid represents interest of approximately 5.84 per cent.

S. Benson of Portland and R. A. Booth of Eugene, members of the state highway commission, were present at the meeting and made it plain that the bonds would have to be sold in the event Oregon was to carry on its road program as originally intended. Mr. Benson said that the bids represented the market quotations for bonds and that because of obligations already contracted it was essential that the commission should have the money at the earliest possible date.

Figured on the basis of \$1,000.00, the bid received is approximately \$14,700 less than the most satisfactory bid of \$9.09 received on May 11 when \$1,000,000 of these bonds were sold.

REGULATION ON GAS MAY BE PROVIDED AT LEGISLATIVE SESSION

SALEM, Or., June 16.—Unless it can be shown by authoritative legal opinion that the public service commission has jurisdiction over the distribution of gasoline in Oregon, it is probable that legislation will be introduced at the next session of the legislature to give the commission that authority. If it is determined that the commission now has that jurisdiction, a formal complaint against the distributors will be made and a hearing before the commission requested.

The commission is in receipt of a letter from the Portland Garage and Repair Men's association asking if the commission has this authority. Expert legal opinion in Portland, the letter says, is that the service board has power to act because of the relation of gasoline to public welfare.

Fred G. Buchtel, chairman of the commission, does not think the commission's jurisdiction covers gasoline distribution, but will refer the letter to Attorney General Brown.

Six Russ Bolshevik Divisions Destroyed

WARSAW, June 16.—Six Russian Bolshevik divisions have been destroyed by the Poles between the Dvina river and the Beresina, according to dispatches to the war office from the front today.

LONDON, June 16.—The anti-Bolshevik forces in Southern Russia, under General Wrangel have occupied 10,000 square miles of territory north of Crimea, said an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Constantinople today. The capture of 800 additional Bolshevik prisoners by General Wrangel's army was reported.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 16.—Polish forces have retaken Kieff in a strong counter-attack upon the Bolsheviks, according to a dispatch received here today. The Poles inflicted heavy casualties on the Red armies.

Salem Boy Scouts Leave For Outing

SALEM, Or., June 16.—More than 100 Boy Scouts of Salem left Monday by special train for Oak Ridge, Lane county, where they will pass the next month. They are in charge of Earl Cook, Scout Master, and the latter's mother, who will supervise the culinary department. From the terminus of the railroad the boys will walk 12 miles into the timbered districts before establishing camp.

J. W. EXON INTO JUDGESHIP RACE AS INDEPENDENT

J. W. Exon, of the Monitor section, was in Oregon City Wednesday and announced that in response to a call from a large number from both political parties, he had decided to enter the race as an independent candidate for county judge. Mr. Exon in announcing his candidacy stated that his record as an advocate of good roads coupled with the feeling that the road building campaign planned for Clackamas county calls for a county judge in full sympathy with the proposed road program, justifies him in ignoring party lines and asking the suffrage of the voters as an independent candidate.

With the exception of about eight years Mr. Exon has been a resident of Clackamas county since 1890. For several years he was a steamboat captain on the Willamette and Columbia rivers. At the present time he is engaged in farming and breeding registered stock at his home near Monitor in the southern part of the county.

Mr. Exon, in outlining his policy, promises a square deal and an economical business administration. He will make an aggressive campaign in every section of the county.

HANDSOME GIFT IS MADE WILLAMETTE U. BY ROCKEFELLER

SALEM, June 16.—The general education board of the Rockefeller Institute has presented Willamette University with a gift of \$350,000, to be applied on the additional million dollar endowment campaign, it was reported to the board of trustees in annual spring session here Tuesday.

An additional \$17,500 will be forthcoming from the same source for a period of two years to care for increased salaries and new laboratory equipment, provided the trustees contribute a like amount. A resolution calling for an average increase of 40 per cent in professors' salaries was passed, and three additional trustees were authorized for departments in English, history and education.

The \$350,000 building campaign, reported to be progressing satisfactorily, was ordered carried to completion.

POPE BENEDICT XV RELINQUISHES DUTIES ON ACCOUNT ILLNESS

ROME, June 15.—Upon the advice of the papal physician, Professor Battistini, Pope Benedict XV has relinquished many of his pontifical duties and begun a semi-vacation.

The pope was said today to be suffering from excess of uric acid, hereditary gout and rheumatism. He suffered one rheumatic attack in the right arm which necessitated hypodermic injections and massage treatment.

LAST STAFF MEMBER OF GENERAL LEE DIES IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, June 16.—The Rev. W. W. Page, last living member of the staff of General Robert E. Lee of the Confederate army and rector of St. Paul's church, Cornwall, N. Y., died here last night. He was 80 years old and was at one time religious editor of the New York Herald.
