Aune, Fred E., private infantry, West Linn, died of wounds received in action, July 21, 1918.

Berner, Albert E., private (branch not given), Hoff, died of meningitis December 2, 1918.

Bingham, Merle Campbell, private marine, Oregon City, killed in action October 4, 1918.

Boylan, Lester M., private, training camp, Oregon City, died of pneumonia October 20, 1918.

Brown, Burton T., private infantry, Canby, died of suicide, July 23, 1917.

Bruzzese, Nick, private infantry, Milwaukie, killed in action November 11, 1918.

Caulfield, Waldo E., sergeant engineers, Oregon City, killed in action, October 2, 1918.

Cockarline, Conrad C., private infantry, Estacada, killed in action October 4, 1918.

Damours, Elmer L., private first class engineers, Molalla, killed in action September 11, 1918.

C. I. Stafford Laid To Final Rest

The funeral services over the remains of the late C. I. Stafford, were held from the Presbyterian church Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock, when the church was filled to capacity with the many friends of the family. Rev. M. T. Gilbert, of Salem, officiated, and during the services the choir, numbering about 20 members, sang "My Jesus As Thou Wilt," "Lead Kindly Light" and "Nearer My God To Thee." Miss Sydney Evelyn Ford was the accompanist. Mr. Stafford had been a member of the Methodist choir for the past nine years.

Following the services the remains were removed to Mountain View cemetery, where the interment took place, many friends following the remains to their last resting place.

The floral tributes were in great profusion and were beautiful. Among pieces sent was a harp from the choir and a large wreath from the official board of the Methodist church.

Succession for Spinach

Spinach can't be depended upon after the middle of June at the latest for the warm weather sends its spinning up to seed, but Swiss chard, really the ideal greens plant of them all, the quick results and ease of handling can be started at any time up to the first of July, even later if desired. It will give a crop within a month and a half.

Swiss chard makes a big, thick

succulent stem and midrib, that may be eaten prepared like stewed celery or boiled like asparagus with butter sauce. It is easily prepared and is tender at almost all stages of growth.

In order to make the greens more palatable looking when cooked, it is really best to cut out this fleshy midrib and cook it separately or throw it away if it is not desired. There is considerable difference of opinion about the cooked stems of the chard. The flavor is very delicate and some people declare that it has not enough taste to pay to cook it.

Reds Accused Of Murdering Nurses

NEW YORK, June 15.—The Polish bureau of information has announced the receipt of a cable, dated Warsaw, June 13, stating that Bolshevik troops which cut the communication with Kiev between Berdyozov and Zytomierz, signaled their entrance into the latter town by burning a military hospital and killing 600 wounded soldiers. They also murdered all the doctors and sisters of charity.
