WELL KNOWN WOMAN
OF CANBY PASSES
AWAY ON THURSDAY

CANBY, June 23.—Mrs. Clifton Hendershott, nee Ivy Hutchinson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Hutchinson, of Molalla, formerly a resident of Canby, where she was well and favorably known, died at the home of her aunt, Mrs. R. Soper, of this city, last Thursday morning, after an illness of about five weeks. Mrs. Hendershott's death was caused by septic poisoning. She was brought to Canby where she could receive medical care. Dr. H. A. Dedman, the family physician while they were residents of Canby, being consulted. Everything was done to save her life, which proved fruitless.

Mrs. Hendershott was born at Hubbard, November 22, 1859, and moved to Canby when two years of age, and resided there until moving to Molalla in 1912 with her parents, where she was united in marriage five years ago to Mr. Hendershott. She has since made that place her home.

Mrs. Hendershott is survived by her husband, two children, Verne, aged three years; Cecil, age one year; her parents Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Hutchinson; two sisters, Mrs. Myrtle Cary, of Portland; Miss Ora Hutchinson, of Molalla; three brothers, Gilbert, Delbert and Wallace Hutchinson, of Molalla. She also leaves two aunts, Mrs. R. Soper, of Canby, and Mrs. Zeek, of Hubbard, besides many friends of this city, Hubbard and Molalla.

The funeral services were held from the home of Mrs. Soper Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock and conducted by Mrs. Russell, of the First Spiritualist church of Portland. The services were largely attended, many of whom came from Hubbard and Molalla, as well as from this city.

The interment was in the family lot in Zion cemetery this having been requested by Mrs. Hendershott a short time before her death, and laid to rest beside those of her brother, Roy, who died about a year ago. SALEM, Or., June 22.—Four applications for permits to appropriate forks of Little Butte creek, Fish lake reservoirs for the irrigation of more than 300 acres of land near Eagle Point in Jackson county, were filed in the offices of the state engineer here today by the Rogue River Canal company.

Application also was made by the company to appropriate water from Bear creek and waste and seepage water from the various streams, gulches and water courses, crossed by the main canal, Hopkins lateral and other canals of the corporation in Bear creek valley, for a supplemental supply for the irrigation of 55,000 acres of land in Jackson county.

Part of the irrigation system has been constructed and has been in use for a number of years. It is estimated that the total cost of the proposed development will exceed \$1,250,000.

VAUGHN MOTOR WORKS
NEGOTIATING LEASE
OF SILICA MINES

Lease of the properties of the Silica King Mines company at the eastern outskirts of Oregon City to Elbert Vaughn of the Vaughn Motor Works, of Portland, is being negotiated, it became known Thursday. Charles F. Terrill, president of the Silica King Mines company, and its owner, when interviewed, would not divulge any of the terms under which the lease is being made.

With the change of control of the mining company greater development of the properties is assured, it is said. Mr. Terrill will be retained, according to officials of the company, as manager of the mine and will be in charge of its operations.

Preparations are being made at the mine for extensive operations this summer. Work is rapidly progressing on the construction of a new mill, and other improvements, that will cost approximately \$25,000. New roadways have been constructed into the properties and crews are at work installing machinery and devices for the transmission of electric power to the mill.

Silica—a commercial mineral—was first discovered on the Terrill farm in the spring of 1916. Later a large deposit of silica sand was found, and is now being developed, although the most of the attention of the company is directed to the milling of the crystalline silica, for which a great demand has arisen.

A small mill, the first of its kind in the northwest, was erected on the properties soon after the discovery of the mineral in 1916. Since that time the Silica King Mines company has steadily increased in resources and has set a pace in the production of this product in the west.

Since the inception of operation at the mines needs of highway contractors for filler in asphaltic pavement has required practically all of the time and efforts of the firm. The state and Federal highway commissions have affixed their stamp of approval on the silica as a pavement filler, and the largest highway contractors in the state and Washington are being furnished with the product for their roadwork.

Foundries in Portland, and other cities, are being furnished with silica sand for their use. The ability of the foundries to procure this necessary mineral so easily has opened up a large market in foundries in all parts of the state.
