CHAS. WALKER HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENT NEAR CANBY TUESDAY

As Sheriff Wilson was in Portland at the time of the accident, Deputy Sheriff Hughes hastened to the scene of the accident, and in company with Garrett the men were brought to Oregon City, and later taken to the home of Walker. After arriving here Walker was wrapped in a blanket and made as comfortable as possible, as he was suffering from his injuries.

Jones escaped injury. He is from the East.

The deceased is survived by her husband, two sons, Percy and Jacob, of Port Angeles; a sister, Mrs. Annie Johnson, of Clackamas Station; four brothers, two of whom reside in Portland, and are Floyd and Albert Watkins; John Watkins, of Carson, Wash.; Oscar Watkins, of Astoria, Wash. Mrs. Pollanz was a sister-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Hannay, of this city. Mrs. Pollanz' father, J. T. Watkins, died two years ago. Her mother died some time ago.

The remains are to be brought to Oregon City for burial, and will arrive here Friday evening. It is probable the services will be held in this city Sunday, no definite plans having been made as to the time of the funeral.

Machine Tender Is Severely Scalded

SOCIALISTS ADOPT RESOLUTION AT MEET HELD HERE SATURDAY

The Socialist party of Clackamas county held a meeting in this city Saturday, June 19, and elected officers and their nominees for the fall election. At this meeting they adopted a resolution expressing their faith in the Socialist party as a solution of the government question. The resolution follows:

We, the Socialists of Clackamas county in convention assembled reaffirm our allegiance to Socialism as the only practical remedy for present chaotic conditions. We endorse the National platform as adopted in New York City May 12, 1920, as the practical expression of our faith. We lay at the feet of Capitalism with its profit system, the creation of selfishness with war, famine, disease, crime and starvation as a natural result. Labor and Capital cannot unite under Capitalism, and a nation divided within itself cannot stand. Under Capitalism, or the present profit system, the world is facing war and starvation. We define profitism as the direct opposite of profiteering. We believe in organized institutions that help to feed, clothe and educate the people. In other words, we believe in changing our national policy so our government will be a help and a blessing to the people instead of a financial and spiritual burden.

One fifth of the earth's surface is today controlled by socialism, which is evidence that it is the coming order to supercede capitalism. We trust the people will bring this new system into existence by peaceful methods, and not wait until man's institutions are a wreck and chaos ensues.

We are in favor of liberating all political prisoners who are serving sentences for political, religious or other views, and have committed no crime whatsoever against society. We declare our friendship to all people, regardless of tactics, who recognize the profit system as man's enemy at this time.

Califf mowed the fence-busters down in one-two-three order, and although he allowed seven hits he was airtight in pinches and kept the hits so well scattered that they did not bring in the runs.

Up to the 13th, inning no scores had been made and in the first half Hesse-Martin succeeded in putting one over. When the mill boys came to bat the first two went out in short order, but Krueger made first on an error by the Portland shortstop after Jones had succeeded in getting on Jones scored and Lagesson brought in Krueger with a hit.

Young Califf was knocked out during the game by a fast one in the stomach, but in a few minutes he was up and struck out the next man.

Preceding the Hesse-Martin game the C-W boys took the Taylor motor company team into camp by a 6 to 2 score. This was a postponed game and with the two wins Sunday the Crown Willamette boys are well up in the race of the Class AA league.

Nude Man Depressed Parade Is Staged Starts Lively Fire

George Kodisch, a recent arrival in Milwaukee, decided the weather was too warm Friday morning and proceeded to disrobe. This would have been O. K. but Kodisch started a parade of his own on the main street of that city, which the officials decided was too much for the welfare of Milwaukee and arrested him, and made him dress.

He was brought to Oregon City by Deputy Sheriff Reed and Constable Lowe and placed in the city jail. A short time later a smoke was noticed coming from the jail and a fire alarm was turned in. Local officers were elsewhere at the time and no key to the jail was available and axes were secured from the city fire department and the locks broken. Kodisch had again taken off his clothing and piled it in the middle of the floor and set it afire. When rescued he was nearly suffocated from the smoke and was removed to the county jail. Very little damage was done to the city jail.

Kodisch at first gave the name of Weimer, saying he preferred it to his own. He was sent to Milwaukee by an employment agency of Portland and was to work at the open air sanitarium. When questioned he said he had been in the asylum on three different occasions and that he was always depressed. He said he did not remember when he worked last but that everything was hard work, even sitting in the jail. Although the man had \$65 in cash and two watches on him when arrested he said he was always hungry because he could not get enough money for food.

Kodisch is about 48 years of age and was born in Germany. He has been in the United States for 23 years and lived in Oregon for the past 15 years. He said that several years ago he was struck on the head by a falling rock and was operated on in Spokane but has been depressed ever since.

Hospital attendants at Salem were notified and Kodisch was taken to the asylum Friday evening.

Taking Young Deer Must Be Stopped

Word has been received here from the state game office that it is unlawful to capture young fawns during the closed season and those caught at this practice will be prosecuted.

This practice has been indulged in for some time by people who wish to raise the deer for pets and other purposes and the officers claim that it is a hindrance to increasing these animals, as the mother deer is better able to take care of her young and they are not as likely to die as when raised by humans.

Thirty Years Ago Today

Taken From Oregon City Enterprise, June 19, 1890.

Yesterday morning, Dr. Harvey, of Milwaukee, shot his mother while she was lying in bed beside her husband, then placed the pistol to his own head and put an end to his life, falling in a pool of blood beside the bed.

The particular in brief are as follows: He rose at an early hour, went and milked, then returned to the house and undressed, after which he took a new revolver and descended to the room in which his mother, Mrs. Mary Ann Burnell was sleeping and shot her over the body of her husband, then shot himself. Mr. Burnell being deaf did not hear the report, but at 6 o'clock awakened and attempted to arouse his wife. Finding he got up and found her lying in a pool of blood beside the bed. He rushed and called help. N. H. Harvey hurried to the scene of the tragedy, but nothing could be done. Both lingered till about nine o'clock, when they died within a few minutes of each other. The cause was undoubtedly insanity.

Fields.—At her home in Canemah on the 13th day of June, of heart disease, Sarah, wife of Amos Fields, aged 61 years, 11 months and 10 days. She was born in Hunsworth, England. 1825, and seven years later Mr. Fields emigrated to America, leaving his wife in England, and three years later she joined her husband. In 1871 the family came to Oregon, first locating in Brownsville and then moved to Oregon City, where Mr. Fields worked when first arriving in Oregon.

For two years Mrs. Fields has been in poor health, and for the last seven months confined to her bed. She was held in the highest esteem by all, who knew her, and was an active member of St. Paul's church, being a member of the guild also.

Mrs. Fields was the mother of nine children, among these are Clark Ganson, and Mrs. Joseph Ganson, of Oregon City.

The funeral services were conducted from St. Paul's Episcopal church at 11 o'clock Sunday morning, with many friends being in attendance.

CITIZENS VOTE DOWN PROPOSAL TO BUY HARDING BUILDING

The suggestion of the committee that the Willamette hall be purchased for \$20,000 was turned down by a vote, several voting against it and the remainder failing to vote.

E. G. Caulfield made an address in which he favored building a good hall at the old site and remarks by C. Schuebel, Charles Kelley, J. J. Tobin and others clearly brought out the fact that building a hall was favored and the purchase of some old building will not meet with the approval of the citizens.

No plans were made for another meeting as it was decided that these were merely a waste of time and did not get the city anywhere. Some of the councilmen stated that they intended to open a campaign for the sale of the bonds and would see to it that they were sold in the city. In this campaign it is planned to give the citizens a chance to buy the bonds and these councilmen were confident of their ability to make the sale.

When the councilmen open this campaign for the sale of the bonds they plan to make it one of the liveliest boosting events that has ever taken place in Oregon City and they will give the city a building that it can well be proud of.
