NEW NOMINEES TO BE PICKETED BY SUFFRAGISTS

WASHINGTON, June 17.—Suffragists are to appear their fight for the ballot to the Republican nominees for president and vice president, they said today.

Both Senator Warren G. Harding, Republican nominee, and his running mate, Governor Coolidge, are to be asked what they intend doing toward final ratification of the federal anti-fraud amendment, according to Alice Paul, head of the National Woman's party.

Miss Paul said suffragists will picket during his speech accepting the Republican nomination.

The woman's party will send a delegation to San Francisco to the Democratic national convention, Miss Paul declared, "but there will be no picketing."

"Suffragists will insist on action of the Republicans and if they fail to act the National Woman's party will call a national convention of the American women voters and we will ask these voters not to support any candidate or party that is responsible for the delay in the ratification of the suffrage amendment."

Ford May Turn Out German Zeppelins

DETROIT, Mich., June 17.—Representatives of German manufacturing interests have arrived in Detroit and will meet Henry Ford in conference at noon today, it was learned here. It was understood that the conference had to do with plans looking towards manufacture of Zeppelins on a large scale in America by the Ford interests.

The decisive vote, it was reported, prompted the labor chief to state to the convention late today that he "was not quite sure" he would be a candidate for reelection.

Mr. Gompers fought hard against the convention's action, declaring it was a step toward the "enslavement of the workers as government employees," to whom he said, had been denied many political and economic rights under the past administration. He received only a mild ovation.

The United Mine Workers and the powerful railroad workers' organizations combined to bring about Mr. Gompers' defeat. They also had the support of the machinists' union and the metal trade organization, all powerful voting factors.

The carpenters' union and the building trades organization stood loyally by Gompers, but were overwhelmed.

Idaho Democrats In Favor of League

LEWISTON, Idaho, June 18.—Democrats of Idaho, in state convention here last night endorsed the League of Nations without reservations, condemned criticism of President Wilson and adopted a resolution favoring enforcement of the Volstead act to the letter. Twenty-four delegates were elected to attend the San Francisco convention with one-third vote each. Robert Elder was reelected national committeeman. The delegation is headed by United States Senator John F. Nugent.

The delegates are uninstructed, but are known to favor William Gibbs McAdoo. The Idaho delegation will place in nomination the name of James H. Hawley, former governor, for vice-president.

NORTH FORK CLOSED

District Game Warden H. E. Meek is placing signs along the North Fork of the Molalla river to warn all that that stream and its tributaries are closed to fishing and fishermen caught there will be arrested.

This river was closed June 1, 1919 and will remain so until June 1, 1921, according to the law.

EXCESSIVE PRICES ON COAL WILL BE PROBED

WASHINGTON, June 17.—A drive on profiteers in bituminous coal was ordered today by Attorney-General Palmer.

All federal district attorneys were ordered to give special attention to charges of such profiteering and to seek indictments where investigation warranted.

"The department of justice," said Mr. Palmer's instructions, "is receiving a number of letters in which complaint is made that bituminous coal prices at the mines now range from \$7 a ton to \$11 a ton with a further increase imminent. The writers say that operators are attributing the advances to car shortage and export demand, emphasis being placed on the export demands."

"Production cost figures gathered by the federal trade commission from 1589 bituminous coal operators in the principal production regions, mining roughly about 60 per cent of the annual output show that during January, 1920, their costs a ton averaged \$2.32 at the mines. Since then there has been an increase of 27 per cent in the cost of labor, increasing the production cost to \$2.79 a ton. The accuracy of these figures is borne out by information in letters coming to the department."

"This situation demands the prompt attention of all United States attorneys. Please give special attention to the matter and seek indictments where investigation discloses that an unreasonable profit has been taken, advising the department of the action taken."

WOOL GROWERS OF WEST MAY BE GIVEN AID

CHICAGO, June 17.—Establishment of a fund of \$100,000,000 to extend financial aid to Western wool growers awaiting the re-establishment of the wool market, was considered by a conference here today of Western bankers and sheep ranchers. Chicago bankers were asked to displace the Boston banks in financing the annual wool clip of the country, which plan, if successful, would make Chicago the nation's wool center.

Chicago bankers were inclined to view the proposition favorably today, provided they were given the support of the Western bankers. Boston has been forced to relinquish its hold on this financing because of the present tight money market, speakers said.

Today's conference was held at the suggestion of W. H. P. Harding, governor of the federal reserve board, and was attended by Western bankers and sheep ranchers. Senators Walsh, Montana; Pittman, Nevada; King, Utah; Hitchcock, Neb., and Chamberlain, Oregon, called the meeting.

HUNDRED THOUSAND AMERICAN PACKAGES FOUND UNDELIVERED

PARIS, June 19.—More than 100,000 American parcel post packages have been found by Y. M. C. A. investigators which have been lying in French ports undelivered for many months. Owen A. McGill, postmaster of the Paris Y. M. C. A., said that the investigators found 40,000 American packages at Havre "and nearly all of 100,000 packages still in the original sacks in which they arrived from America."

Owen A. McGill, postmaster of the deaux, St. Nazaire and Cherbourg. Mr. McGill explains that the French have no parcel post system and American packages are handled as freight.

Investigators said one per cent of the parcels were addressed to service men, 20 per cent to American civilians, and the remainder to French citizens, many of the latter packages being gifts from soldiers who have returned to the United States.

OHIO MINERS ARE IS ACTUAL NEED IS ASSERTION OF CHIEF

COLUMBUS, O., June 17.—Though miners are receiving the highest wages ever paid them and the demand for coal is far in excess of the supply, many Ohio miners are actually suffering from hunger, according to George W. Savage, secretary treasurer of the Ohio United Mine Workers.

Miners at Byesville, Guernsey county, say they have been averaging only one day's work a week for some time owing to the car shortage.

According to Mr. Savage, mines furnishing railroad fuel are able to operate on full time and he severely criticizes the Interstate Commerce commission for alleged discrimination.

Summer Resort Open for Season

NEWPORT, Or., June 21.—The opening of the swimming pool at Newport is accepted as the beginning of the season of 1920 at Newport. Most of the cottages have been rented though few are occupied. The real estate agents state there has been no advance in rents, but that there has been a great demand for better cottages with bathrooms and other modern conveniences, showing that Newport is becoming more popular among discriminating persons.

PILOT IS KILLED WHEN SEAPLANES CRASH IN MID-AIR

PENSACOLA, Fla., June 17.—Two seaplanes crashed together in mid-air today and fell more than 500 feet into the gulf. William B. Livingston, chief electrician, piloting one plane, was killed and his body was not recovered.

Lieutenant John Frasnorth, pilot of the other machine, was not fatally hurt.

Sues To Collect Wages Due For Work

A. S. Hassel filed suit Friday against the Logan Lumber company to collect wages he alleges are due him for work amounting to \$44.

According to complaint this work was performed between May 30 and June 17, 1920.

In addition to this amount Hassel asks payment of wages of other employees who have turned these amounts over to him. These are J. B. Merritt, \$40; T. J. Hay, \$16.50; R. E. Davidson, \$37; George M. Hively, \$29.65; John Carey, \$12.75; George Tracy, \$17.50; N. A. Roth, \$50; D. J. Davidson, \$45; Emory Keller, \$15; Susan Whitbeck, \$27.50; G. A. Coupland, \$20.75; Victor Malone, \$26.77; C. L. Horn, \$67.30.

STATE WITHOUT AUTHORITY TO FIX GAS PRICE

SALEM, June 18.—Without additional legislation the Oregon public service commission is powerless to regulate the price or distribution of gasoline, according to Attorney General Brown, who, in an opinion rendered Thursday, holds that gasoline is not a public utility within the meaning of the public utility act as it now stands.

The opinion was written in response to an inquiry from the commission as to its jurisdiction in the present gasoline emergency.

"You have no more power as a commission to regulate the price of gasoline than you have to regulate the price of distribution of wood or coal," the opinion reads. "You have no power to fix the distribution or allotment to the public nor to regulate the price or distribution of coal to the public utilities of Oregon, nor have you any more or greater authority to distribute or make the rules for the distribution of gasoline."

"We cannot enlarge the meaning of the law by construction or by interpretation for the purposes of meeting the situation as it exists today. The situation may present a proper matter for legislation, but not a fit subject for the enforcement of the public utility law as it now exists. Until a law exists there can be no enforcement thereof."

Russ Ambassador Has Been Recalled

WASHINGTON, June 18.—Ludwig C. A. K. Martens, who for more than 15 months has been in the United States as the self-styled soviet ambassador, has been recalled by the soviet authorities, it was learned tonight in official circles.

Martens' confidential secretary, Sanford Norvieve, left the United States several weeks ago by way of Canada, and now is believed to be attending the conferences being held in England by Gregory Krassin, bolshevik minister of commerce, it was said tonight by department of justice officials.

PORTLAND MEN BUY SHIPYARD EQUIPMENT OF SEATTLE FIRM

SEATTLE, Wash., June 21.—Skinner & Eddy's shipyard equipment and steel has been sold to M. Barde & Sons, of Portland. It was announced Friday afternoon, the deal including everything except the buildings and site.

The price was reported to be in the neighborhood of \$1,500,000.

Some of the equipment and steel will be disposed of locally and the balance taken elsewhere, it was announced.

The equipment and steel involved is what is known as yard No. 1 of the Skinner & Eddy corporation. Acres of ground are covered with high-priced equipment.

The sale means the end of the mammoth shipbuilding enterprise which attained world-wide fame during the war. Mr. Barde was in charge at the plant Friday afternoon. The firm has bought shipyard equipment and steel at many cities in the United States recently.

At Skinner & Eddy's uptown office it was stated that negotiations with Barde & Sons were under way but that the deal had not been finally closed. It was given out that the deal was closed.
