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AUTO ASSOCIATION PREPARES NEW LAW TO STOP CAR THEFTS

WASHINGTON, June 28.—A proposed uniform anti-theft law aimed to protect the 7,500,000 automobile owners in this country was announced today by the American Automobile association. It was prepared by a conference committee of representatives of the leading organizations of the motor car industry.

The proposed law that will be presented to state legislatures declares possession of an automobile with identification marks removed to be unlawful.

Upon transfer of ownership of a car its registration would expire and state automobile officials would have to be notified for new registration cards to be issued.

When cars are stolen the state automobile officials would be notified and from the state office notification with description of stolen car would be sent to all other state automobile officers for record.

Maximum imprisonment for automobile theft is recommended to be fixed at 10 years with maximum fine of \$5000.

Hawley Successor Named By Olcott

SALEM, June 25.—Governor Olcott has named John F. Steiwer, of Jefferson, to succeed C. L. Hawley, of McCoy, as a member of the committee of 15 which will investigate proposed changes in the workmen's compensation act, for recommendations to the next session of the state legislature. Steiwer will be a member of the group of five representing the state at large.

Hawley asked to be relieved from membership on the committee after his nomination as a candidate for the office of state dairy and food commissioner.

Housekeeper Late; Asks for Damages

WINNIPEG, Manitoba, June 24.—The Grand Trunk Pacific railway has received an unusual request from a Saskatchewan farmer, who demanded \$5000 from them because of alleged delay of six weeks in securing transportation for his housekeeper, who was coming from Louisiana. A later letter compromised on \$1000.

"Please do not make me go to law about this," he urged, "for I know that you have more money than I have. Just send the money along and I will call it square." He has not yet received his \$1000, officials stated.

Rosarians Plan On Trip to Honolulu

HONOLULU, T. H., June 25.—Portland's "Royal Rosarians" the peppy bunch of business and professional men of the Rose City of Oregon want to come to Honolulu during the Fiesta here next February. All they ask for is a boat to bring them here and they are willing to have the boat pick them up at Portland and bring them direct to Honolulu. They declare they have an organization of 125 and will bring along guests to swell it to 300. All this according to a letter from E. J. Jaeger to the local tourist bureau.

Local organizations of a social kind are strong for the visit.

REV. MILLIKEN HAS ACCEPTED BAPTIST PASTORATE AT SALEM

PORTLAND, June 28.—Dr. William T. Milliken, pastor of the Highland Baptist church, will next Tuesday accept the pastorate of the First Baptist church of Salem, having handed in his resignation a month ago. He has been connected with the local church for the past 11 months and prior to his arrival in Portland held the pastorate of the Baptist church of Oregon City for more than seven years.

His pastorate at the Oregon City church was the longest for the last 70 years. The Highland church has called to its pulpit Rev. Walter L. Riley, pastor of the Baptist church, Wenatchee, Wash. It is thought Mr. Riley will accept the call. Mr. Riley was unusually active in war work and has been prominent in the church and community life of Portland since his residence in the city, as a specialist in educational work and as platform speaker he is well known.

Mr. Riley is a brother of Rev. William B. Riley of Minneapolis, pastor and a man of marked ability. Members of the Highland church congregation believe he will be a strong addition to Baptist forces of the city.

O'DOWD AND ORTEGA FIGHT PRETTY DRAW AT MILWAUKIE ARENA

The majority of fans left the Milwaukee arena Thursday night feeling that Mike O'Dowd had bested Battling Ortega, despite Referee Denver Ed Martin's decision of a draw. Sympathy was with the Pacific coast brawler, because geography is thicker than fact, but cold reason, standing aloof from sentimentalities of boundary lines, gave the palm to the battered-face Irishman of St. Paul.

Referee Martin took Ortega's aggressiveness and willingness as a ballast for the accuracy and directness of O'Dowd's masterly hitting and tactics.

The only rounds that might be credited to Ortega were the third, fourth and fifth. The first and second were probably fairly even. In the sixth O'Dowd forged ahead with the clean-punches.

In the seventh he extended his lead by severely rocking Ortega with head and stomach blows. In the eighth the two men slugged each other, with O'Dowd packing the glory roll. The ninth was another fierce round with O'Dowd holding the lead. The tenth belonged to O'Dowd without argument. Ortega was weaker and weaker in this round than in any of the others. Ortega surprised by the amount of punishment he could absorb.

Johnny Noye and Young Brown fought a 10-round draw, with a shade going to Brown. It was a fight no less thrilling than that between O'Dowd and Ortega. Noye gave Brown more trouble than did Gorman and Bronson. Noye used a left hook and a right uppercut that more than once nearly upset Brown. Brown was the aggressor throughout and delivered four punches to every one sent out by Noye, but Noye's were the most effective.

Allie Mack and Frankie Murphy went eight rounds to a draw. The fight seemed slow, with Murphy vainly trying to swing a knockout and Mack jabbing and stepping back.

Danny Edwards and Frankie Garcia fought a six-round draw, but Edwards appeared to the best advantage. Edwards put up a wonderful fight against a boy who appeared much larger.

Johnny Fluke nearly stopped Ted Hoke in the last of their six-round set-to. Fluke carried too many guns for the knockout kid. Both boys went down in the second round.

Baby Blue won as he pleased from Mike De Pinto, although Mike made a vain attempt to stem the tide after being twice sent down for the count of nine.

INTERNATIONAL MEET OPENED IN PARIS; U. S. IS REPRESENTED

PARIS, June 25.—The International Congress of Chambers of Commerce, in which the United States is represented by a delegation, opened its session Wednesday. Etienne Clementel, former French minister of commerce, was unanimously elected president of the congress. His name was proposed by John H. Fahy, of the American delegation.

M. Clementel will be assisted by four vice-presidents, one of whom will be chosen from each of the visiting delegations.

In his opening address M. Clementel welcomed, in the name of France, the delegates from Belgium, Great Britain, Italy and the United States in the order named. He laid special emphasis on his welcome to the Americans, saying it was through American initiative, energy and hard work since the convention of United States Chambers of Commerce at Atlantic City in April last that the International Chamber of Commerce has become a reality.

HARVARD DEFEATED BY YALE AT ANNUAL VARSITY BOAT RACE

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 25.—Yale triumphed over Harvard in the first two events of the annual regatta here today, winning both the freshman and junior varsity races.

Yale took the junior varsity race by a full length, while the finish of the freshman event was close.

Harvard took the lead at the start in both races, but Yale spurred at the one mile mark. In both events the Yale crew was able to take the lead at the halfway mark and hold it until the finish.

The official time for the freshman race was: Yale, 10:03 2/5; Harvard, 10:06.

Time for the junior varsity race: Yale, 10:06 2/5; Harvard, 10:10.

Edison Employees Granted Increases

BOSTON, June 24.—An increase of 10 per cent in the pay of all its employees, effective July 1, has been granted by the Boston Edison company. It was announced today. About 2000 workers will benefit.

At the same time the company will make a reduction of 5 per cent in the price of electricity for lighting to its 115,000 retail customers.

Oregon City's Growth

Many people will be disappointed over the census figures for Oregon City, but a close analysis of the total, taken with the gain, is, after all, quite gratifying, especially in comparison with other cities. The percentage of increase of 32.6 is nearly double the percentage of Eugene, for example, though the actual numerical gain is less.

In 1890 Oregon City had a population of 3167. Ten years later the figures were 3494, a gain of 327 or 10.3 per cent. From 1900 to 1910 the figures swelled to 4287, a gain of 793, or 22.7 per cent. In the last 10 years the percentage of gain has been considerable in excess of previous decades, the present population being 5686, or a gain of 1399 in 10 years, an average of 140 each year.

If the percentage of gain should hold, the city's population in 1930 will be 7540, and in 1940 it will be 10,000.

Housing facilities will solve the problem of growth for Oregon City, and the solution will not be found in any other way. This city has lost at least 1000 persons within the last two years, due to the fact that the number of dwellings has been altogether inadequate to meet the demand from manufacturing concerns. This condition forced the woolen mill to turn to Portland for its expansion, and the possibility of town growth through this source was lost. West Linn, Gladstone and other suburban districts have been developed at the commercial expense of Oregon City, which has so far failed to meet the demands of workers for homes.

The question of whether the federal government counted all of the actual residents of the city is one that cannot be answered. It may be assumed that the count here was made in as efficient manner as in other communities. Upon the telephone average of one phone to every four persons, Oregon City has obtained all she really deserves, as there are 1535 telephones in service, including the districts of West Linn, Bolton, Willamette and Gladstone.

NEWS REPORTERS ARE BARRED FROM INNER COMMITTEE SESSION

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—The Amalgamated Society of Persecuted Convention Reporters held an indignation meeting today.

Given the "freedom of the convention" by the Republicans in Chicago and by the Democrats here to date, the reporters couldn't understand it when the national committee Saturday decided to chase them out of the committee room just because it wanted to hold an executive session to decide the Georgia and Missouri contests.

The hall outside the committee room was bare of chairs; the floor was concrete and, oh, so hard on the feet, and, worst of all, the walls had been freshly painted, making it impossible to lean against them.

There the reporters waited for the crumbs of news to be thrown to them from the committee news table standing about on one foot like herons, or marauding up and down the hall. And visitors came to them from the Republican national committee did it. In Chicago the newspapermen had the same status as committeemen in all except voting, being permitted to sit in on the most secret of secret conferences. But, still more important was the fact that at noon each day a wonderful buffet luncheon was served the committeemen in the private dining room and the reporters were their guests. At the Auditorium today there wasn't even a ham sandwich.

After it was all over the reporters, huffing their woes to their breasts, wended their way sadly to their hotels and reflected upon the cruelty of the world in general, and the Democratic party in particular.

After being paid off, it is understood the crews will get a long shore leave.
