FRANKLIN ROOSEVELT
OPENS BIG ARGUMENT
TO BREAK UNIT RULE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—Franklin Roosevelt, assistant secretary of the navy, opened the argument before the navy committee today in favor of a resolution to permit the New York delegates to vote as individuals, thus breaking the unit rule as far as that state is concerned.

This change is favored by New York delegates, who want to vote for McAdoo. Under the unit rule, they claim Tammany would control the delegation and cast its solid vote for whichever candidate Charles F. Murphy favored.

Plane Shatters All
Non-Stop Records

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. June 28.—Darkness last night forced the Larsen airplane, which left Omaha Sunday morning for New York, to come to earth at Pine Valley, 15 miles east of here, but not until all American non-stop flight records had been shattered, according to John W. Larsen, one of the passengers.

The aviators made another stop half way between this city and Lancaster, Pa., which point Larsen said, was about 1200 miles from Omaha. This distance, he declared, was the longest non-stop flight ever made in America. The men were in the air a few minutes less than 11 hours and allowing for the added mileage caused by losing their way a number of times, covered approximately 1400 miles.

Leaving Omaha at 5:12 A. M. the machine, a "J. L." all-metal biplane, piloted by Bert Acosta and carrying Mr. Larsen and W. Hugh, a mechanical engineer, encountered dense fog and strong side winds almost immediately. These conditions, Mr. Larsen said, prevailed virtually throughout the journey, and were directly responsible for their not being able to reach their goal.

J. L. SCHUYLEMAN AND
TURNER WIN SEATS
AT DEMOCRATIC MEET

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—Administration supporters strengthened their hold on the Democratic national convention through a series of victories in the credentials committee which decided three hotly fought contests.

One of these was the denial of a seat in the convention to Senator James A. Reed of Missouri. The Clark Howell delegates in Georgia pledged to Attorney General Palmer also were seated. Both actions were in accord with previous decisions of the national committee.

The credentials committee, however, overruled the national committee in the Oregon case, when it seated R. R. Turner and John L. Schuyleman, giving each one-half a vote. Turner, who was selected by the Oregon state committee to fill a vacancy caused by the death of George T. Baldwin, was forced to yield half of his vote to Schuyleman, described as a strong administration supporter. Schuyleman claimed the seat on the ground that he was the next highest man in the primary, having been fifth in the race for the four places.

Demos. Have Many
Second Place Men

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—Although completely overshadowed by the campaigning of presidential aspirants, vice presidential booms were being inflated today by backers of ten potential candidates. Far from being disheartened by being beyond the glow of the central spotlight under which presidential candidates are basking, second place men were busy lining up votes.

Both Governor Cox of Ohio and Secretary of Agriculture Meredith of Iowa today continued to be mentioned as possibilities for the vice presidency, although both will be placed in nomination to head the ticket. Meredith's friends are striving for a coalition with Cox supporters, while Cox is hoped by some for second place on a McAdoo slate.

Meredith's formal statement of withdrawal from the presidential race is believed to have greatly strengthened his chances for the second place.

That the plaintiff has a just and valid lien on all of the real property herein described, created by the mortgages described in plaintiff's complaint, to secure the payment of said sum of \$1150.00, with interest thereon at the rate of 8 per cent per annum from the 15th day of June, 1917, until paid, and to secure the payment of the sum of \$150.00 as a reasonable attorney's fee, and for its costs and disbursements incurred herein, and that the lien of the plaintiff upon said real property is prior and superior to any lien, estate or interest of the said defendants, or any of them, or of any person whomsoever.

And for a further decree that the lien created by said mortgages on the real property situated in the County of Clackamas, State of Oregon, to-wit:

The East Half (E½) of the Southwest Quarter (SW¼) of the West Half (W½) of the Southeast Quarter (SE¼) of Section Eighteen (18), Township Five (5) South, Range Three (3) East of the Willamette Meridian, containing 160 acres, more or less;

be foreclosed in the manner prescribed by law for the sale of real property upon execution to satisfy the sums adjudged to be due to the said plaintiff on account of said notes and mortgages, attorney's fees, costs and disbursements, and that the plaintiff may be a purchaser at such sale.

And for a further decree that said defendants, H. R. von Wiedner, G. B. Dimick, Francis P. Garvan, Allen Property Custodian, and Security Savings & Trust Company, a corporation, and each of them, and all persons claiming by, through, from or under
