Custer, widow of the famous American general killed in the Sioux Indian campaign, was one of the 3,000 visitors to Governor's Island in New York Bay to attend the combination garden party and field day held by the Army Relief Society, the Sulgrave Institution, and fifty-three other national patriotic organizations. The celebration was held in commemoration of the landing of the Pilgrim Fathers 300 years ago and the centenary of the first American legislative assembly. Mrs. Custer made an address telling of the work being accomplished by the Army Relief Society for the widows and children of deceased officers.

Brooks-Scanlon Buys Big Timber Tract

BEND, July 16.—The Brooks-Scanlon Lumber company Wednesday announced the purchase from the Northwestern Timber company of 26,000 acres of white pine timber adjoining the former company's present holdings in Central Oregon. It is understood that the sale involves \$1,500,000.

Although the timber acquired under this purchase may not be cut for the next ten years, the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber company desires to have a compact body available to assure operations with any future increase in cutting that the company may decide later to put into effect.

MEDFORD, July 16.—Seventeen employees of the Lodge and Anna Spring Camp hotels at Crater lake, quit Monday night and Tuesday morning and came to Medford Tuesday night. Of the half dozen employees left it is said several will quit during the day.

The action of the employees is said to be due to conditions at the Crater lake hotels, which are declared to have been deplorable since the formal opening and led to orders by Director of National Parks Mather, who visited the lake recently, that Alfred L. Parkhurst, president and general manager of the Crater Lake company, which has the hotel concessions at the lake, give these up within two weeks. The conditions it is said have been steadily growing worse.
