ARMISTICE IS ACCEPTED BY RUSS AND POLES

LONDON, July 24.—An armistice has been arranged between the two commanders of the Russian and Polish armies in the field, and it is understood that fighting in the Russo-Polish theatre of war ceases immediately, according to official telegrams received here today.

It was stated, however, that the full terms of the armistice may not be reported by Moscow and Warsaw for several days.

The allies will not be represented in any way at the armistice negotiations, it was stated in official circles. British officials said that the final and complete terms may not be received here until an agreement is reached and signed by the Polish and Russian government representatives.

A dispatch received in the Central News earlier in the day said that the Poles were shortening their battle line for the better defense of Warsaw.

The eastern boundary of Poland, laid out by the council of ambassadors at Paris, has been crossed by the Russian Bolshevik army over the whole front, said the earlier dispatch.

The following Russian wireless dispatch from Moscow to Warsaw was picked up here today and given out by the government:

"The Soviet has ordered the supreme commander of the Red army to commence negotiations with the Polish high command and to conclude an armistice that will prepare the way for future peace. The Russian high command will advise the Poles of the place and date where the armistice is to be signed."
