GREAT VARIETY OF GOODS GATHERED AS EVIDENCE OF ROBBERY

MILWAUKIE, Aug. 5.—The hearing of the three men arrested on Rock Island last Monday on grand larceny charges, will be held at Justice Parry's court room Friday. The men, Webb Miller, George Phillips, and H. N. Wertheimer, are in the county jail at Oregon City, under \$1000 bonds which they were unable to raise. Evidence in the case has been piled up in the court room until it resembles a general store, as considerable quantities of stolen goods were recovered at the island. Beneath the floor of one tent was found a large box filled with canned goods, and under the floor of another were several packages of groceries. Officers found a buried candy pail under the stoop to one tent, filled with small articles from grocery shelves. Three lockers were found to be stuffed with tobacco, canned goods, and other stolen items. The men are alleged to have been accumulating stolen property for the past some time and the officers claim that one shipment of stuff had been taken away just before they arrived on the scene. The arrest of the young men was effected by Sheriff Wilson, Constable Lowe, or Milwaukie, Deputy Sheriff Hughes, and a Burns operative, who caught Miller in Portland.

The most of the goods had been taken from the Bassett store at this place. Boxing gloves, blankets, and miscellaneous stuff from the arena were also in the evidence gathered by the officers. A large mirror from the lobby of the moving picture show had been broken into two parts and was recovered. The most of the goods has been identified by owners, but there seems to be reluctance in filing charges against the men. It has been intimated that another resident of the island is implicated in the series of robberies which have infested Milwaukie recently, and he is under surveillance.

A number of cases of speeders have been occupying the justice court lately. The marshal's office has been running down clues in petty robbery cases, as a number of places have been broken into lately. It is thought likely, with the arrest of the gang on the island, that a ring of thieves has been broken up, and that depredations will cease.

Milwaukie, while metropolitan in a number of respects, having a mayor and city ordinances and officers, etc., has no jail, and officers are registering complaints with the administration in the hopes that such an institution may be established. Prisoners now have to be taken to Oregon City for safe-keeping, and as arrests are sometimes made in the dead of night it works an unnecessary hardship, especially, as they usually have to be brought back here for arraignment before the local justice of the peace. The "pen" as it is called here is the only place for holding prisoners, and as it is a wooden structure it necessitates the employment of a guard to watch those under arrest. The law specifies that a guard must be maintained on offenders incarcerated in wooden buildings.

The Milwaukie Cash and Carry Store has been recently opened by H. L. Clark, who has operated the pool room near the depot for the past year. The room adjoining has been fitted and stocked up with a nice line of goods, and Mr. Clark reports a splendid run of business. He intends to dispose of his pool room and devote his whole time to building up a larger grocery business.

Building activity is good, reports the Hart-Hardway company but the scarcity of some materials is holding up things in general. Shingle nails, for instance, are almost impossible to get, as a number of other items are almost as scarce as gasoline, it is reported. Every day there are inquiries for places to live in Milwaukie, but practically every house is occupied.

MACHINE SHOP OPEN

MILWAUKIE, Aug. 5.—The Milwaukie Machine Shop opens this week on Main street, with Fred Bjork in charge. A complete equipment has been installed, and the plant is a credit to the city. Milling machines, lathes, shapers, punch presses, planers and a variety of special tools and machinery equip the place for any grade of work, and Mr. Bjork has already lined up some fine business. A patent valve cap for automobiles and a patent nut-lock will be manufactured in great quantities on contract, and general repairing on automobiles, farm machinery, and mill work will be handled. Mr. Bjork formerly operated his shop at Water and Hawthorne streets in Portland, and is known as a mechanic of rare ability.
