## CANBY GRAIN CROP SHOWS UP EXCELLENT PRODUCTION AVERAGE

CANBY, Aug. 12.—The grain in this section of the county is now being threshed, while a number of the farmers have already completed their task of threshing and storing their grain.

This year was a favorable one for the grain, although it did not attain the height as that of last year, thus producing more straw, but the kernels were well filled, and the product on all that was looked forward to by the farmers.

Among those having completed threshing are George and Ellis Brown, prominent farmers of New Era. Mr. Brown, besides being successful in growing potatoes, receiving the name of "Potato Brown," due to his success has averaged from his grain this year 35 bushels to the acre, and 180 acres were planted to wheat and oats. ## STATE DENTAL BOARD NOT IN FAVOR OF LICENSES EXCHANGE

SALEM, Or., Aug. 5.—Because of tendency of members of the dental profession to come from the eastern states to the west, while few go from the west to the east, the state board of dental examiners has placed its disapproval on a proposed reciprocal exchange of dental licenses. This stand was taken by Dr. W. D. McMillan, secretary of the Oregon board at a meeting of the national board of dental examiners held at New Orleans.

"It is entirely probable that in time a federal examination board may be created," says the Oregon board's 32nd annual report to the governor, "and thus devise some method of a fair reciprocal exchange of licenses, but any method which will permit dentists to locate in the western states without some form of examination, or merely by the registration of their licenses or certificates from some other states, should be opposed by this board until such time as an equitable system may be proposed whereby the dentists now registered in this state shall be assured of compensating advantages elsewhere."

## BATTERY EFFECTED BY SUMMER HEAT

"Nobody expects a man to stop his car a half dozen times on a boiling hot day just to see if his battery is getting too hot," says C. J. Hilgers, Willard Service Station dealer.

"At noon and at night the careful driver feels of the battery terminals. If the terminals seem hot he turns on the lights for an hour or two. This relieves the battery of its surplus charge. Unless this precaution is taken the battery plates may be warped so that repairs will be necessary."

"Another thing to remember is that summer heat increases the evaporation of water from the cells. This water must be replaced. Many drivers make a habit of putting a little distilled water in to each cell every week. Of course precautions must be taken against putting too much. If a cell is over full some of the solution will overflow through the tiny vent at the top of the jar, and will cause rotting of the battery case corrosion of connectors terminals, and so on."

## BONDS MUST BE USED FOR PURPOSE WHICH THEY ARE VOTED FOR

SALEM, Or., Aug. 5.—Proceeds of bond sales must be used for the specific purpose for which the bonds are voted, unless a vote of the people authorizes otherwise. This is the reply of Attorney-General Brown to an inquiry of Max Gehlar, district attorney for Marion county, whether the proceeds of \$25,000 bonds voted by the Aurora school district for construction of a new school building may be used instead to retire the bonds. It would be necessary for the voters of the district to authorize a different use of the bond fund, the attorney-general holds.

## NEW BANK ASKS CHARTER

SALEM, Or., Aug. 5.—Incorporators of the proposed new state bank of Scott's Mills today filed articles at the office of Will H. Bennett, state superintendent of banks. The capitalization is \$15,000 and incorporators are Charles Scott, A. L. Brougher and J. O. Dixon. The superintendent will pass on the proposal.

## SUES TO COLLECT

Ziegler & Miesner filed suit Saturday against Angelo Tegli to collect \$662.57 alleged to be due for merchandise sold the defendant between October 29, 1918 and January 5, 1919. The original bill was for \$1654.82 and plaintiffs allege that of this amount only \$992.25 has been paid.

## HUBBARD FARMER IS INSTANTLY KILLED IN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT

AURORA, Or., Aug. 9.—Philip Ott, 45, a farmer of Hubbard, Or., was killed almost instantly at 8:30 last night when his light touring car crashed through the railing of the bridge over Pudding river, just outside of the city limits on the Pacific highway north, and fell a distance of about 40 feet. Ott was pinned beneath the machine. He sustained a skull fracture from which he died before medical assistance could be given.

Just how the fatal accident happened is not known, as Ott was alone at the time and there were no witnesses. An automobile driven by H. F. Morden of Portland arrived at the bridge, going toward Portland, a few moments later. Members of the Morden party lifted Ott from beneath the machine. He died while members of the Morden party were giving first aid to him. Coroner Clough of Marion county could not be found so the body was brought here.

The accident was on the Marion county approach to the bridge. Mr. Ott was unmarried and lived with his brother Isaac on a farm near Hubbard.

## ASKS FORECLOSURE

Leona Guedon filed suit Thursday against Henry Guedon, Job Zaddikar and George Buchanan to foreclose a mortgage on property in Oregon City given to secure a note of Guedon's given to C. D. and C. C. Latourette. The note was given October 14, 1913, and was to run one year and was transferred to plaintiff, who alleges that Zaddikar and Buchanan claim some interest in the property on account of a judgment they obtained from Guedon. She asks that the mortgage be foreclosed and the plaintiffs be barred from any interest in the property.

## AUTOIST GIVEN DAMAGES

John Scott was given \$17.05 damages from W. T. Meredith, whom he alleged ran into his car at Eighth and Main streets last February. The case was tried before Justice Stipp Wednesday.

According to the complaint Meredith ran into Scott while the former was making the turn at the intersection.

## DEPUTY SHERIFF LONG RAIDS MOONSHINERS AT DONALD, OREGON

One hundred and fifty gallons of corn whiskey, 650 gallons of mash and other supplies for distilling liquor were seized Friday night in a raid by Deputy Sheriff Long and revenue officers at Donald, W. R. Dempsey and G. Johnson were arrested and charges of operating the plant were filed against them.

Fifty gallons of the whiskey was found in an automobile, which the officers believe was ready to start for Portland. The supplies captured consisted of four sacks of sugar, nine sacks of corn meal, 100 pounds of hops and 200 gallons of kerosene. The kerosene was for use in distilling the mash.

## PAPER MILL WORKER HAS FIRST VICTORY BUTTON ISSUED HERE

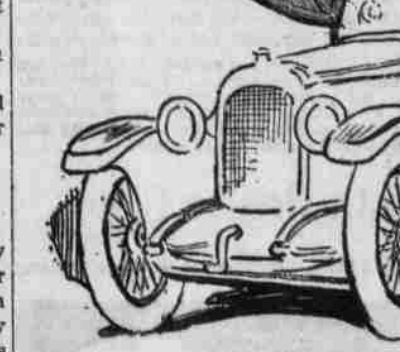
