CITY OF MILWAUKIE TO COLLECT FINES IN TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS

MILWAUKIE, Aug. 11.—The city of Milwaukie is out after some of the money contributed by speeders, and have installed a special traffic officer to handle the prosecutions. H. L. Griffith has been appointed to serve on the job since last Saturday. Arrests made by the new officer are handled through the city court, and Mayor Snider is assessing fines in the absence of the city recorder.

On Tuesday the following were brought up for hearing, with results as shown: Dr. G. E. Watts, bail of \$15 forfeited; R. E. Samuelson, motorcyclist, fine \$10; E. E. Mayer, \$10; F. Lisar, \$10; W. T. Phillips, \$3; A. C. Brandea, of Brandea Creamery company, forfeited \$10 bail; E. P. Horn for exceeding the limit with a bakery delivery auto, fined \$10; D. Harvey and F. R. Steelhammer, of Vancouver were fined \$8 and \$7.50 respectively; G. O. Matter, of Portland, who was arrested and fined \$15, will appeal the case, and it will be heard before Justice of the Peace Parry. It is understood that Matter will make a test case of the affair, to see if the arresting officer had jurisdiction.

With the commencement of activities by the city, a number of cases heretofore handled by justice court will go to the city court, and a considerable amount of money diverted from county to municipal funds. No little revenue is derived from fines for speeding and violation of traffic laws and the authorities hold that it is within their province to collect the fines assessed for fractures of city ordinances.

Officer Griffith is an active member of the force, the storm signals are out along the Milwaukie sector for speedsters, road hogs, careless drivers, and over-loaders.

TRUCK OVERLOADING TO BE PROSECUTED SAYS SPEED OFFICER

MILWAUKIE, Aug. 11.—Claiming that it took 13 trips to haul 18 cords of wood and that a cord of seasoned oak would weigh about 2500 pounds, Joe Mendl couldn't see the justice of his recent arrest on a charge of overloading a two-ton truck. Speed officer Long, who made the arrest, submitted evidence to Justice Parry, before whom the case was heard on Tuesday tending to show that the truck was carrying a cord and a half of wood that would weigh 3680 pounds to the cord. Being unable to prove that his two-ton truck did not carry less than the weight charged by the officer Mendl was assessed a fine of \$5, with \$5.25 costs extra.

The overloading of trucks must stop, asserted Justice Parry, who has had special instructions from the county court to prosecute such violations vigorously. Officer Long stated that it was an easy way out of the high license fee for owners of trucks to pay only for the rating of their trucks, and then over-load them 50 per cent. It was explained that any truck owner can secure a license for a higher capacity than his truck is rated by the manufacturer, if he applies for it, and as these larger tonnage fees are greater, the state is paid for the wear and tear on the roads. A two-ton truck should carry a three-ton license, and a three-ton truck a license for a five-ton truck, according to the testimony of a witness who had recently been warned about his loads.

OSWEGO CITIZENS ARE STRONGLY OPPOSED TO MACADAM ROADS

Oswego citizens went on emphatic record at a well attended mass meeting Monday night against the proposed macadamizing of the stretch of highway between the Multnomah county line and the city limits of Oswego, and urged the highway commission to lay hard-surface.

Mayor Climefelter presided, and the purpose of the meeting was explained by Edward Cousins, who served as secretary. It was reported that the state highway commission would state Tuesday to open bids for graveling the road, and residents of Oswego and the surrounding territory who were present at the meeting were unanimous in their opposition to such a plan. It was urged that all the grades on this sector were gravel.

The plans of the commission, as reported at the meeting, called for travelling from the Multnomah county line to the west end of the bridge at Oregon City, but the influence of the meeting Tuesday will be brought to bear on the concentration of the work on the 2 miles just north of Oswego. It is understood that the highway commission objects to paving such a small unit, and were it not for the unseasoned hills and new grades south of Oswego on the road toward Oregon City they would be asked to pave a larger portion.

A committee was appointed to confer with the commission at their meeting Tuesday, and if the matter came up for settlement, were to exert their influence toward securing a permanent surface.
