ANNUAL SCHOOL FOR TEACHERS IS BIG SUCCESS

A business meeting of the Clackamas County Teachers' association, to be held in connection with the teachers' training school now in progress at the Oregon City high school, has been called for next Thursday afternoon at 1 o'clock at the high school building, and the officials of the association are anxious that a large percentage of the instructors of the county turn out. Many important matters will come up before the meeting, among which will be the election of three delegates to attend the state convention at Portland late in December, according to announcement made at the summer session Friday. The school closed a profitable week Friday, and will finish up its work next week.

Exceptional interest has been manifested in the three weeks' course this year, and an attendance of 120 teachers was recorded Friday. J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction, will speak at the lecture hour next Wednesday, and other prominent educators are scheduled for talks. E. D. Resler, dean of the department of education at the Oregon Agricultural college, talked Tuesday on the benefits of the Oregon State Teachers' association, and inaugurated a campaign for new members. Sixty-five teachers signed up for membership, and it is the hope of the association to obtain a hundred per cent membership. H. C. Seymour, state club leader, and Miss Romney Snedeker, county club leader, were the speakers at the lecture hour on Wednesday, outlining the work of the clubs in the county and state, and enlisting the support of the teachers in carrying on the projects for the coming year. Among the other speakers of the past week were Miss Alabama Brenton, art instructor at the Oregon Normal school, who talked on art work; T. J. Gary, former superintendent of schools in this county, now of Portland, who took for his subject, "The Ideals of a Teacher"; Miss Kathryn Arbutnot, of the Oregon Normal school, who gave a group of monologues and readings Thursday. A special number on Thursday's program was a solo by Miss Lenora Burr, and a piano solo by Miss Aletha Kidby. Superintendent R. W. Kirk, of the Oregon City schools, proved an interesting speaker Friday, talking on "The Mind of a Child."

The class of youngsters who are members of the primary class in instruction under the direction of Mrs. Mary Fulkerson, rural school supervisor of Marion county, are proving apt pupils, and Mrs. Fulkerson is giving valuable demonstrations in primary work to the teachers in attendance. Members of the class are Dorothy Wheelan, Vivian Hart, Velma Cox, Louis Barry, Harold Wiewesiek, Donald Rands and Marian Berry.

ARMY AIRPLANES LAND IN ALASKA AFTER LONG FLIGHT

WRANGELL, Alaska, Aug. 17.—The army airplane expedition en route from Minot, N. Y., to Nome, Alaska, reached here late Saturday afternoon, having traveled the 216 miles from Hazelton, B. C., in 2 hours and 27 minutes.

A perfect landing was made on Serge Island near here and was witnessed by the entire population of Wrangell, including a number of Indians to whom the planes were objects of great interest.

Captain St. Clair Street said the flight from Hazelton to Wrangell was over an almost continuous chain of glaciers and had proved by far the most interesting part of the trip. The aviators took a number of pictures while in flight.

Mayor J. H. G. Grant delivered to Captain Street, a cablegram from Governor Thomas Riggs, welcoming the aviators to the territory and regretting he could not be present to greet them. At the request of Mayor R. E. Robertson of Juneau, Captain Street promised that the airplanes would fly over that city on their way north. The expedition left this afternoon for White Horse, Yukon territory, a distance of 300 miles.

RECEIVERSHIP SUIT STARTS IN BOSTON AGAINST C. PONZI

BOSTON, Aug. 17.—Receivership proceedings against Charles Ponzi and his \$15,000,000 get-rich-quick company began in the United States district court today before Judge Morton. The appointment of a temporary receiver is sought by Attorney John Crowley, chairman of the committee named by the state's attorney General Allen to look after the interests of speculators in Ponzi's notes.

Machine Gunners Get Decorations

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—The second and third machine gun battalions have been added to the American expeditionary force units authorized by France to wear the "fourragere," the war department was advised today. The decoration was awarded for exemplary conduct in the face of the enemy, the second battalion for the part it played in engagements south of Soissons, July 18-22, 1918, and again from October 21-23, and the third at Cantigny and Soissons from May to October of the same year.

Mr. Alldredge is a well known Oregon City young man, being the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. John Alldredge. He has been over-seas, recently returning to the United States, and was a petty officer in the wireless service.

INFANT LOST LIFE IN HOUSEBOAT FIRE CAUSED BY OILSTOVE

PORTLAND, Aug. 13.—Left by himself in a houseboat at the foot of Derby street, Earl May Blackburn, 18-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. George Blackburn, was burned to death shortly after noon Thursday when an oil stove in the boat exploded and destroyed the Blackburn home and that of George McFarland nearby.

McFarland, who is a night watchman, was sleeping in his houseboat and so rapidly did the flames spread from the Blackburn home, that he was slightly burned in making his escape.

Mrs. Blackburn had left her baby sleeping in a cot near the oil stove and went to a friend's house while lunch was being cooked. When she discovered the fire, her home was a mass of flames. She rowed to the house in a skiff and got so close to the fire that the intense heat overcame her.

Neighbors who ran to the fire heard the child screaming and then two explosions.

Blackburn is employed at the Portland Pottery works and McFarland at the National Tank & Pipe company. Engine No. 30 was called to the fire and a special run was made outside of the city limits.

The Blackburn home was a palatial houseboat valued at over \$2000. In addition it had a gasoline launch in the housing alongside valued at \$1500 which was also destroyed. The McFarland loss amounted to \$1500. Neither of the families carried any insurance.

Los Angeles Bus Drivers on Strike

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 17.—Tying up service on nearly 500 buses, the union stage drivers working out of the union stage depot in Los Angeles today joined with the drivers of San Diego and Bakersfield in a strike for a 25 per cent increase in wages. Only a few stages left Los Angeles this morning, the drivers of the large number of others failing to appear for their scheduled runs. Nearly 1000 men were reported out.

Democrats Plan For Congress Fight

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—Final plans for the Democratic congressional campaign in contested states were drawn at a conference Monday between Chairman Flood of Virginia, chairman of the Democratic congressional campaign committee; Congressman Oldfield of Arkansas and Congressman Doremus of Michigan.

Speakers will be sent into every state in the congressional fight and means are being devised for the creation of a campaign fund.

T. J. Edwards filed suit Monday against Gus Anderson to collect \$75 alleged to be due for room rent. Edwards claims that he rented the room to Anderson February 25, 1919, until July 21, the same year, at \$16 per month and that only \$15 has been paid.

BREWER FINED \$50 FOR GIVING WOMAN BOOZE

"Yes, Judge, I will admit that I did make some beer and gave some of it to Mrs. Holland, but there are two thousand families in Oregon City making it every day and I don't think that I am any worse than the rest. I am not experienced in the work so some of my beer was not very good and in all I think I have made only about 20 gallons," was the statement of Henry May Monday when he was arraigned before Judge Loder on charges of making and giving away liquor.

"I know that many of my neighbors are making liquor," said May, "and one of them is the man who had me arrested. Just wait until I find that he has made any more and I surely will have him arrested. It is against the law and never will be stopped no matter what steps are taken."

"It can and will be stopped," was the rejoinder of Loder, "and if I was of a mind to I sure could stop you for about 90 days, but as you seem to be a hard working man and claim to support your granddaughter, I hate to lock you up at all."

Just before noon Monday a telephone call came to the sheriff's office that May and the woman were intoxicated and Deputy Sheriff Hughes started for the place but met the couple on Seventh street and arrested them. He secured a search warrant and found about a dozen full bottles at the May home and a number of empty ones.

When arraigned May at first denied giving the woman any liquor, saying that she helped herself, but soon changed his plea to guilty and was fined \$50 by Loder. He was released to the custody of Hughes and promised to pay his fine Tuesday morning.

When asked why he made the beer May said that he had only started since the hot weather and used it for refreshments. Mrs. Holland was asked why she drank it and replied: "Because I like it, Judge."

May is a resident of Oregon City and Mrs. Holland's home is in Portland.

Neither showed signs of intoxication when arraigned.

PAPER COMPANY PURCHASES BIG TIMBER TRACT

Purchase of 125,000,000 feet of spruce and hemlock in the H. E. Noble tract on Tillamook head, near Seaside, by the Crown Wilmamette Paper company for approximately \$250,000 was announced today by Mr. Noble. The tract will be consolidated with the Hammond Lumber company lands recently purchased, making it one of the largest operating bodies of pure spruce and hemlock in the Pacific northwest. It extends from the north side of the head, a mile below Seaside, to the Nehalem river.

The Noble tract is mostly high-grade spruce, with an average stand of 60,000 feet to the acre.

The Crown Wilmamette a few months ago purchased the 17,000-acre Hammond tract, and the latest deal is another indication that paper companies are looking well into the future for a supply of pulp wood. There are now several miles of railroad and extensive logging equipment in this body of timber, the tracks connecting with the North Bank line at Holladay station, below Seaside. Logs are hauled in solid trainloads with the company's own equipment to the Columbia river at Warrenton, where they are rafted and towed to the mills at Camas, Wash., and Oregon City.
