If the bee men are organized steps will be taken to have the spraying time of fruit trees changed to an earlier date as it is claimed that with the spraying done when the trees are in bloom the bees take poison from the spray and carry it to their hives, which become sour. It is claimed that spraying at an earlier date will bring the desired results and save a great amount of honey that is now a loss.

Mr. Jenison has been in the bee business for years and at his old home in Europe won several prizes with his hives. He is willing to explain his methods in producing honey and when the meeting is called will give a talk on the industry.
