Reckless Driver Pays Heavy Fine Tuesday

MILWAUKIE, Aug. 18.—Carl J. Long, county assessor, appeared as the complaining witness against Philip Sutter, well known Portland horseman, when he faced trial in Justice of the Peace Parry's court Tuesday for speeding his automobile around curves at 40 miles an hour. Sutter defended himself by saying that he was rushing an ill man to his train, but Long claimed that he endangered the lives of dozens of other motorists in his wild dashes through the traffic. He was fined \$50 and costs for his recklessness.

The arrest was made last Sunday on the river road near the foot of the Oak Grove hill, after Long had pursued the car for several miles. According to Long's statement, a party of Multnomah deputy sheriffs was following the car with the idea in view of apprehending the driver when he crossed the line.

Milwaukie Enriched By Speeders' Fines

MILWAUKIE, Aug. 19.—Special Traffic Officer H. L. Griffith, working for the city, has developed a profitable business stopping violators of the traffic ordinances, and a total of \$153 in fines was collected from offenders by City Recorder Matthews during the past week. Previous to the employment of Griffiths two weeks ago these fines were collected in the justice court and turned into the county funds. With the money into the city, it is expected that a fund for street use will be accumulated, with a general reduction of taxes as a natural consequence.

Railroads Fight 2-Cent Fare Law

CHICAGO, Aug. 17.—Suits were filed in district court yesterday by seven railroads to restrain the public utilities commission and Attorney-General Brudage from enforcing the two cents fare law, which is to become effective August 31, when federal guarantee to the road ceases.

The suit also asks that State's Attorney Hoyne be restrained from enforcing the intrastate fare law.

Government Land Offered For Sale

PORTLAND, Aug. 18.—Instructions opening for sale isolated and fractional tracts of government land in Oregon and California have been received by the United States land office here. The tracts under the ruling are grant lands which have been open for entry for two years or more, and must be sold at not less than \$2.50 per acre, plus the appraised value of any timber on the land. Land thus secured, it is said, will have clear title and will not be subject to regulations necessary under homestead entry.

Land included under any proposed engineering project under consideration by the federal water power commission will be reserved from entry. It was announced, except when the commission determines that such entry will not interfere with power development.

Under entries of this class, however, the commission reserves the right to enter and occupy any or all parts of such land for power development, paying the occupants damages. The federal water power commission was created June 10, 1920, and lands entered prior to that time are not affected.

LANDSCAPE EXPERT URGES DEVELOPMENT OF MT. HOOD LOOP

PORTLAND, Aug. 16.—The people of Portland and vicinity should make some organized effort for the development of the Mount Hood area, stated Dr. Frank A. Waugh, landscape architect of Amherst, Mass., and collaborator in the forest service, who left Portland Sunday after a six weeks' visit in the northwest forests. Dr. Waugh has made a careful examination of the Mount Hood region, working with the forest service and members of the bureau of public roads, including O. H. Purcell, district engineer, in planning the road so that it will take in the best scenic effects.

Dr. Waugh explains that the vast utilities of recreation and health contained in the Oregon national forest, and comprising a large part of the Mount Hood region, cannot be developed by the forest service. The beneficiaries in the form of private persons, campers, tourists, clubs, corporations and municipalities must plan the actual development, he states.

In addition to the problem of roads, which are now under construction, trails must be constructed. The Trails club and the Mazamas are already engaged in this work, and the forest service has its own system of trails.

Camp grounds must also be provided for automobile tourists and the forest service is planning several. One is already established at Zigzag creek.

DRY LAW BOOMS RAISINS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—Increased consumption of raisins in the United States since prohibition is believed to account for the 1400 per cent increase in raising imports from Spain during the first six months of 1920. Nearly 8,000,000 pounds were exported from Malaga up to June 30, exceeding the total exports from that port from 1913 to 1919, inclusive.

BOARD FIXES TERMS AND RATE FOR SALE OF STEEL VESSELS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—Terms on which the shipping board fleet of more than 1200 steel vessels approximately 5,000,000 deadweight tons is to be sold to private interests under the new merchant marine act, were announced today by Chairman Benson.

Bids will be entertained, the chairman said, at minimum prices of \$160 a deadweight ton for coal burners and \$170 a deadweight ton for oil burners built on the Great Lakes, to \$175 for coal burners and \$185 for oil burning vessels of over 10,000 deadweight tons.

Terms call for 10 per cent of the purchase price in cash upon delivery, installments of 5 per cent in six, twelve, eighteen and twenty-four months thereafter and the remaining 70 per cent in equal semi-annual installments over a period of ten years.

Deferred payments are to carry 5 per cent interest. Deduction for depreciation is allowed at the rate of 6 per cent for the second year of the vessel's age and 5 per cent for each succeeding year up to the date of purchase.

HOP CROP IS VERY HEAVY PICKING PRICE, \$1.50 PER 100

Hop crop prospects in this section (and in all the hop growing sections) are reported exceptionally fine. Dealers report most of the crop under contract. These contracts are said to run from 22c to 75c. Newspaper reports of 12c contracts are of doubtful accuracy, as no grower can produce hops for less than 15c and would almost surely abandon his yards if his crop were contracted at 12 cents. It is almost certainly true that the cost of production in many yards is nearer 20 cents than 15 cents.

Some well posted hop men estimate that 20,000 bales of the 1920 Oregon crop are not contracted, and some growers believe these uncontracted hops may bring a "dollar a pound." In view of the rehabilitation of the Belgium, French and English hop yards, "dollar hops" in America is a well-oth-wisp fancy, or at the best a most improbable expectation. Half that price will be a most satisfactory figure in the view of many growers—though every one hopes that "dollar hops" may be a reality. The "high cost of hops" is a condition that spells prosperity for the Willamette Valley and harms no one.

N. Y. MAN SHATTERS RECORD ON HIGH JUMP

ANTWERP, Aug. 17.—Athletic advancement was demonstrated today by the wide distribution of honors in the third day's contests in the seventh Olympiad.

For the first time American athletes failed to win one of the six point-scoring places when all four who qualified for the 5600-meter race failed to finish. In all the other finals and qualifying rounds today, however, the Americans were placed, in several cases after sensational performances against strong competition.

R. W. Landon of the New York A. C. won the high jump with a new Olympic record of 1.93½ meters, although it was announced he had made 1.94 meters until a sag of the bar was remeasured. Three other Americans placed.

In the eliminations for finalists in the shotput and broad jump two Americans qualified in each, although hard luck interfered with their performances in the latter event. The shotputters, misunderstanding French officials, put the shot a long time before discovering it was just a warm-up, and later some of them did not do so well as in the practice.

In the broad jump, the negro, Sol Butler, of Dubuque college, American record holder, pulled a tendon in his second jump and could not qualify.

Three Americans also qualified in the 110-meter hurdles.

The most sensational performance was that of the half-milers in the 800 meters final, which Earl Eby of the Chicago A. A. almost won, and in which Lieutenant D. M. Scott, U. S. A., and A. B. Sprott of the Los Angeles Athletic club finished fifth and sixth after a terrific pace. A. G. Hill, England, won by a yard, due partly to the fact that Eby was watching the expected winner of the race, B. G. D. Rudd, of South Africa, who faltered at the tape, while Hill slipped through unobserved.

BOARD FIXES TERMS AND RATE FOR SALE OF STEEL VESSELS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—Terms on which the shipping board fleet of more than 1200 steel vessels approximately 5,000,000 deadweight tons is to be sold to private interests under the new merchant marine act, were announced today by Chairman Benson.

Bids will be entertained, the chairman said, at minimum prices of \$160 a deadweight ton for coal burners and \$170 a deadweight ton for oil burners built on the Great Lakes, to \$175 for coal burners and \$185 for oil burning vessels of over 10,000 deadweight tons.

Terms call for 10 per cent of the purchase price in cash upon delivery, installments of 5 per cent in six, twelve, eighteen and twenty-four months thereafter and the remaining 70 per cent in equal semi-annual installments over a period of ten years.

Deferred payments are to carry 5 per cent interest. Deduction for depreciation is allowed at the rate of 6 per cent for the second year of the vessel's age and 5 per cent for each succeeding year up to the date of purchase.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—Requests for loans of approximately \$200,000,000 of the \$300,000,000 government revolving fund for the railroads, provided by the Cummins-Each Bill, have been made by the Association of Railway Executives, the Interstate commerce commission announced today.

The use of the money is asked for increased equipment for the movement of freight. No recommendations have been made for the extension of loans for passenger equipment.
