

RUSSIAN REDS DRIVEN BACK BY POLISH FORCES

PARIS, Aug. 18.—The Polish counter offensive, with Thorn as its base has successfully cleared the Danzig corridor of Russian troops, according to a report received from the French mission in Poland today. The Polish forces still are driving eastward, the report says.

BERLIN, Aug. 18.—A telephone message from Posen stated that the Poles had forced the Russians back from the Vistula fifteen kilometers. A Koenigsberg dispatch reported success for a Polish counter-attack along the line Pionak-Novogorodsk.

A Bolshevik attempt to cross the Vistula north of Ivanogorod was reported frustrated and the Poles were said to have resumed counter operations southeast of Warsaw.

MOSCOW, Aug. 18.—Bolshevik forces northwest of Warsaw captured 1200 prisoners and seven guns in a battle in which they lost and regained the town of Ciechanow, fifty-five miles from Warsaw, according to Tuesday's official communique. The statement follows:

"The enemy broke through to the Narw and occupied Ciechanow, but was driven back by our counter-attack and we reoccupied Ciechanow. We captured 1200 prisoners and seven guns."

PORTLAND POOL MEN ARRESTED WEDNESDAY FOR THEFT OF CAR

Andrew Hirsuta and Viv Valahakis, who claim to be proprietors of a pool room in Portland, were arrested here Wednesday by Chief of Police Scott and fined \$5 for speeding.

Later the men were again taken into custody by Scott on charges of having stolen the car, a Hudson Super-six, and being unable to produce a bill of sale, were taken to the city jail Wednesday evening.

Sheriff Wilson wired the Portland police department and the car which they were driving is listed under the name of L. Kuna, who was shot and seriously wounded a few days ago in a bootlegging fight.

Gus Vaselli, of this city, knew the two men and put up \$50 bail for their release. Later an attorney of Portland was called. He made several unsuccessful attempts to locate Chief of Police Jenkins of Portland, who, it is claimed, knew of the sale of the car. Vaselli vouches for Hirsuta and Valahakis and they were released by Chief of Police Scott.

The young men say that they had paid \$500 on the car and were to make the final payment, \$1700, Wednesday.

LORD MAYOR FOUND GUILTY OF SEDITION AND IS DEPORTED

CORK, Ireland, Aug. 18.—Terrence MacSweeney, lord mayor of Cork, was deported to England today aboard a destroyer, after having been found guilty of sedition by court martial yesterday. MacSweeney still refused to eat.

MacSweeney, who has refused food since he was arrested last Thursday night, was convicted of having under his control the secret police cipher, of having made a seditious speech on the occasion of his election and of having in his possession a copy of the resolution of the Cork corporation pledging allegiance to the Irish republican parliament.

SUIT IS THREATENED

CINCINNATI, O., Aug. 18.—Mrs. Jerome Sturm, Cincinnati, anti-suffragist leader, announced today that suit would be filed immediately to test the validity of the ratification of the suffrage amendment by the Tennessee legislature.

FREAK LEGISLATION DETRIMENT TO STATE CLAIM OF RETAILERS

Freak legislation will drive prosperity from Oregon rather than promote it, declares the Oregon State Retail Merchants' association, which, at a meeting Saturday issued a lengthy appeal to voters of Oregon, urging them to defeat the 4 and 5 per cent interest measure, the state market commission measure and similarly to vote "no" on all other measures unless they are convinced that the proposed laws are sound.

The directors of the state merchants' association held an all-day session in the Imperial hotel, devoted to a discussion of public problems and trade problems.

Rosekrans of Canby.

Batteries Get Sort of Tired Feeling

It has occurred to a good many car owners that their batteries show almost human signs of a "sort of tired feeling" as summer advances. The starting motor seems to lack "pep." The lights show filaments that look like red hot hair-pins. The horns come through with a low varied groan instead of its usual warning blast.

If the owner who notices this feebleness is inclined to be charitable he says "Of course! It's a wonder the battery isn't plumb dead after such a winter." If he is irritable, he's likely to forget its faithful service and say, "It never was any good anyway." If he is thoughtful, he drives round to a battery service station and has the battery tested and recharged, or repaired as may be necessary.

"There are a few wise drivers who let one experience with neglected batteries serve as a lesson," says C. R. Higgins, Willard Service Station Dealer, "but there are more who prefer to let the battery remind them time after time that attention is needed."

Bacon Relatives Thought Located

Mrs. Jackson is acquainted with a woman by that name and she wrote some time ago that she intended to visit here, but her failure to inform Mrs. Jackson of the time of the trip is no surprise as Mrs. Bacon has been in the habit of starting on a journey on the spur of the moment.

If the deceased is the woman Mrs. Jackson believes her sister, Mrs. Josephine Boyles, lives in Roseburg, where the latter's son is postmaster. Lavier wired the latter Saturday night but up to a late hour did not receive an answer.

Huge Land Fraud Deals Charged

CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—That the defendants had conspired in a \$3,000,000 land grant was charged by William G. Elliott and 12 others who today brought suit asking an accounting by Daniel Hayes Jr., Walter S. Bond, the Daniel Hayes company, the United States Farm Land company of Sacramento, Cal., and its president, C. A. Robertson. More than 500 persons were alleged to have been victims.

The bill states that representations were made that the Hayes company owned 134,000 acres of land in California. It is said that the company owned about 32,000 acres and that the land in question was really owned by the United States Farm Land company.

The operations of the defendant companies have been under inspection in Judge Landis' court for some time. The company operated principally in Iowa, Idaho and California.

In February a petition in bankruptcy was filed for the Hayes company.

FRANKLIN ROOSEVELT TO MAKE SPEECH HERE ON AUGUST 21

Franklin D. Roosevelt, democratic nominee for vice-president, will address citizens of Portland at the auditorium Saturday evening, August 21. Mr. Roosevelt will arrive in Portland at 7:20 o'clock Saturday morning. He will be taken by automobile to Salem, where he will deliver a speech at noon. From Salem he will be conveyed by machine to Oregon City, where he will speak at 3 o'clock, and from that place he will return to Portland for his night address.

This arrangement was telegraphed to State Chairman Smith yesterday and is in conformity with the desires of the Oregon democratic leader. Originally the plan was to have Mr. Roosevelt speak in Portland at noon and then go to Salem for his night speech. The democratic managers protested. It is the purpose of a number of democrats to accompany Mr. Roosevelt to Salem and Oregon City, spending the day with him.

Mr. Roosevelt will leave Portland for San Francisco Sunday morning.

SMALL BOYS ADMIT BURNING BARN IN ESTACADA SECTION

Thomas Moore and Roy Foulmer, two small boys living near Molalla, were brought to Oregon City Tuesday by Deputy Sheriff Hughes on charges of burning a barn in that neighborhood.

When the boys were arraigned Foulmer claimed that the Moore boy had started the fire and that he was with him. Moore absolutely denied the charge, at first, but later admitted that he had started the fire.

The barn was rented by T. B. Moore, father of Thomas Moore.

PROGRAM COMPLETED FOR GLADSTONE MEET OF YOUNG PEOPLE

The program for the Oregon Baptist Young People's assembly to be held in Gladstone park from August 21 to 30 has been announced, and arrangements are about completed for the session. The assembly is an annual feature of the Baptist church, and through the permission of H. E. Cross, owner of the park, and the Chautauqua association, the young people have been given the use of the park each year.

In addition to the members of young people's organizations, Sunday school teachers, pastors and church workers in general will attend the ten-day program. The officers of the Oregon B. Y. P. U. who will preside over the session are Harley K. Hallgren, of Portland, president; A. D. Rossmann, of Portland; George E. Mason, of Pendleton; B. Dot Dotson, of Eugene, vice-presidents; Miss Gladys Turner, of Portland, secretary; Miss Hazel Todhunter, of Salem, treasurer.

The state convention assembly board includes Rev. W. T. Milliken, of Portland, chairman; Miss Lydia Piller, secretary; Rev. O. C. Wright, Harvey E. Cross, of Oregon City; Rev. C. L. Trawn, of Gladstone; and Rev. G. H. Young. A strong group of religious workers has been chosen for the faculty of the assembly, and inspirational lectures will be given in addition to the class work.

James Asa White, president of the B. Y. P. U. of America; Mrs. C. C. Potter, of McMinnville college; Dr. J. S. Reid, evangelist for Oregon; Dr. George F. Holt, promotional director, Washington; Dr. A. M. Petty, representing the national promotion board; Dr. O. C. Wright, superintendent of the Oregon State convention; Dr. W. B. Hinson, pastor East Side Baptist church of Portland; Rev. Allen K. Foster, of the department of promotion; Dr. W. P. White, regional director of the Moody Bible institute; and Dr. George E. Gullie, of the Moody institute.

Delegates are expected from all parts of Oregon. A reception for them will be held Saturday evening August 21, with the Willamette B. Y. P. U. as hosts. A big rally is to be held Sunday at 3 o'clock on the Chautauqua grounds, which will include Christian Endeavor and Epworth League organizations as well as the Baptist union. Meals are to be served on the grounds and tents and beds will be rented by the assembly. Certificates of credit will be given those who complete the class work. General recreational features, under the direction of Rev. J. C. Austin, an expert along that line, are being arranged.

Aurora Man Named In M. Pugh Will

AURORA, Or., Aug. 18.—John Pugh, 70 years old, and well-known resident of this community for several years, has been named one of 26 beneficiaries in the estate of the late Marshall Pugh, wealthy Indianapolis land owner. His share in the estate will be not less than \$25,000, it is said.

Mr. Pugh learned of the death of his wealthy cousin through an advertisement in a newspaper.

Theatre Employees Lose In Decision

PORTLAND, Aug. 18.—Circuit Judge Robert Tucker Monday afternoon issued an opinion holding against union theatre employees in their effort to have set aside a preliminary restraining order forbidding the unions to picket the four local Jensen & Von Herberg moving picture theatres.

After two days of argument, the court holds that the preliminary restraint shall continue in force until the merits of the controversy have been heard and passed upon.

Circuit Judge Tazwell issued the original order on the plea of the Peoples Amusement company and the management of the three other theatres, which were made objects of a strike in sympathy with a similar strike against the Jensen & Von Herberg houses in Tacoma and Seattle. This order was entered July 15.

Judge Tucker holds that it "seems to the court that this litigation gives promise to disclose a situation on trial of the case where direct benefit to the employees is not the chief but a secondary aim of the controversy."

RELATIVES LOCATED

Mrs. Pete Sheridan, of Oregon City, Route 1, received a telegram Sunday from her brother, William Bacon, of New Mexico, that her mother, Mary E. Bacon, had died in Colorado en route to Oregon City.

A telegram was sent to the local police that a Mary E. Bacon had died in Colorado and asked that relatives here be located. Mrs. Jackson informed Officer Lavier that she knew a woman by that name and said that her relatives lived in Roseburg, but a telegram to that place brought an answer that the woman known there was alive.

Auto Driver Dies At Steering Wheel

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 17.—A wire fence, avowed what might have been a more serious accident when Elmo Waldon fell dead from heart failure across the steering wheel of his automobile Sunday with the machine traveling at a rate of nearly 20 miles an hour near the state line.

Waldon was accompanied by Mrs. Edith C. Didion and her two small children. She jumped with her small baby when Waldon slumped down across the steering wheel, but the other child rode into the fence with the machine, which was swerved to one side by the weight of the dead man's body. Waldon was apparently using the foot accelerator, as the engine slowed down when his body relaxed. The fence stopped the force of the machine, and the Didion child was unhurt.

MOUNT HOOD LOOP TOUR OF INSPECTION STARTS ON MONDAY

PORTLAND, Aug. 17.—A tour of inspection of the proposed Mount Hood loop road was begun early Monday morning by a party composed of State Highway Commissioners E. E. Kiddle and R. A. Booth, George W. Joseph, an official of the Mount Hood Loop Road association, County Commissioners Hoyt, Mack and Holman, and Commissioner-elect Charles Rutledge. They will be met at a camp on the route by representatives of the forestry service, and will leave their automobiles to make a 25-mile section on horseback. They will return by way of Hood River and expect to arrive in Portland late Tuesday night. The purpose of the trip is to give those unfamiliar with the project a first-hand knowledge of the engineering problems involved and give them opportunity to witness the scenic grandeur of the proposed road.

Penitentiary Will Have New Scaffold

SALEM, Or., Aug. 17.—The new execution chamber at the state penitentiary will be erected in what is now known as the "bull pen," according to a decision reached by Warden Compton. The scaffold will be of a permanent construction and will be equipped with two drops. The chamber will be sufficiently large to accommodate between 25 and 30 people, and will be strictly modern. Warden Compton said today that actual work on the scaffold would not start until some person is received at the prison under death sentence. "I am not in the habit of crossing bridges until I reach them," said Mr. Compton. "But nevertheless I have my plans completed, and predict at least two executions late this year."

Police Judge Safe In Jail Robbed

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 18.—The safe in Police Judge Chesbro's courtroom in central police station was robbed last night of approximately \$25,000, it was discovered when court opened today.

The robbers overlooked \$20,000, it was said. Checking of accounts later indicated \$22,000, not \$25,000, was taken.

The robbers worked the safe combination and smashed open the cash box. The courtroom is on the second floor of the police station.

SUCCESSFUL DEALER STANDS BY BUYER LONG AFTER SALE

Now they are beginning to interview the people who patronize one dealer or another to find out what is the attitude of that dealer after a sale is made, for they have recognized that the behavior of the car depends as much on the man who sold it as on the man who made it."

New Record Made By Ford Company

March broke all production records ever made by the Ford company, both for the number of cars produced in one day and one month. On March 27, 4256 cars left the assembly lines at the home plant and branches, while the record for the month was 94,299 cars. These figures represent production in the United States only, do not take into consideration the Canadian or foreign plants.

Notwithstanding the fact that production in April dropped less than 50 per cent of normal, because of the strike, Ford officials say that for the fiscal year, which ended July 31, they attained the million mark of production.

Test Suit On Aliens Is Filed

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 18.—A suit to test the act passed by the 1919 Washington legislature requiring foreign-born residents to produce evidence of their naturalization before they can vote, was filed in superior court today by H. Sylvester Garvin of this city on behalf of the railway men's welfare league.

Superior Judge Blake issued a writ, returnable next Thursday afternoon, ordering City Clerk Kellam to show cause why he should not permit David White, a railroad man, to register until he presented evidence of having been naturalized.
