Mr. E. E. Cross, the popular merchant at Gladstone, has received his appointment as postmaster at that place. This office will prove a great convenience to a large number of people residing in that vicinity.

A new sidewalk is badly needed from the Cliff House to the bridge on the Canemah road. The sand on this short piece of street is almost ankle deep, making it disagreeable for ladies passing that way. The popular authorities should see that a sidewalk is constructed there.

The brick work is a completed on the large addition to the woolen mills on the floors have been laid on the first and second stories. Mr. C. H. Meyers, is superintending roofing for Messrs. Pope & Co., who have the contract. The machinery will soon be placed in the new addition, and the capacity of the Oregon City woolen mills will be nearly doubled.

A post office has been established at Parkplace, with Mr. E. C. Hamilton as postmaster, and they are now receiving and sending mail regularly. Mr. E. G. Caulfield will have his residence moved to the lot back of his store, on the river bank. The brick work for the foundation is almost completed.

The Oregon City Iron Works, which have been in operation only two weeks are crowded with orders, and the proprietors, Messrs. Roake and Prosser state that they have to work overtime in order to get through with the work sent them. They are giving splendid satisfaction to their customers.

The suburbs of Oregon City are growing. New buildings are being erected in Parkplace, Gladstone and South Oregon City, while the addition across the river are not behind in their improvements. Parkplace besides other new buildings has a large and commodious store building, erected by Messrs. Hamilton and Allen.

It is to be regretted that visitors to Oregon City do not have a favorable opportunity of seeing our elegant school building. It is very pleasantly situated on a most desirable block, and would be a credit to a larger city than this. While it is centrally located, it is not situated in a place that would be observed by the thousands of people who make a brief and hasty visit to this burg. In the morning they went on an excursion over the motor lines to the peninsula of the Columbia, and returning took the steamer Undine for Oswego and Oregon City. There were about 200 editors and their guests, and on arriving at Oswego a cast of 35 tons of metal was made in presence of the party. In business session they urged that a state board of trade be organized and each town in the state be urged to organize a local board. The Oregon City Board of Trade had appointed committees, and made complete preparations for their reception and entertainment. They were met at the wharf near the woolen mills by members of the Board of Trade and the Oregon City cornet band, when they passed up Main street, past the immense woolen mills and across the suspension bridge to the grove on the bluff where the dinner was spread on the four long tables. Hon. J. T. Apperson, president of the Board of Trade made the address of welcome. Judge M. L. Pipes, E. Hofer, of Salem, H. S. Harcourt, of the Portland Mercury and J. P. Eddy, of the Pendleton Tribune were also speakers. After dinner the pulp and paper mills were visited. The committee on arrangement was E. E. Charman, L. McMahon, and Charles Meserve. Mrs. G. A. Harding and Mrs. F. R. Charman deserve special mention for the elegant lobster salad prepared for the dinner.

Among the relatives who were present were Mr. Bentley's son, J. C. Bentley and family, of Portland, and his grandson, Earl Bentley and wife, of Pulp Sliding.
