HAND WORK AT HOME SAID TO BE EFFECTIVE IN WAR ON HIGH COSTS

MACKSBURG, Sept. 8.—Celebration of the Tercentennial Anniversary of the Pilgrim's Landing may bring an unexpected epoch into the lives of our people especially those who are maintaining so uncomfortable a disproportion between the price of their important staple wool produced on our farms and that of woolen goods.

Not even in colonial times were hearts more eager or hands better fitted to help the Nation's cause than are those of the present day.

Nothing except stress of circumstances is required to develop in our people, a degree of diligence and ingenuity as high as that which will be eulogized at this celebration, both in story and song.

Among the plans to correct the unequal status of production and distribution is one to utilize that most important staple wool at home instead of passing it into the hands of the selfish profiteer.

A few spinning wheels such as those the Puritans used may be found among relics stored away, put into running shape and used to convert wool into knitting yarn which, in the stores, would cost more than a dollar a pound.

The knitting habit called out by the war has, by no means, died out.

Hands that were so ready to help in winning the war, have lost none of their alacrity and are ready now to fight the H. C. L.

Instead of sweaters costing fifteen or twenty dollars apiece and sold at a dollar per pair, we can make them from our own material at home.

Monopolists could they know what was revolting in the brains of busy women in our land might discover dangers of salt delayed till those dangerous foes mice and mother and pursued to a ruinous extent, their devastating trade or until that other equally subtle enemy Fashion had set her deadly seal. Never even to the most needy, except at the greatest sacrifice, can old-fashioned things be sold.

Visions of warehouses filled with commodities that will not sell may well haunt their owner, now for signs that this prospect is no dream, are no longer few.

AUNT BETTY THOMAS LAID TO FINAL REST

The death of Mrs. E. T. B. Thomas, in a Portland hospital on Wednesday August 25, removed from the community one of its most interesting characters. Mrs. Thomas had lived here since 1856, coming from Kentucky, after spending a year on Howell Prairie moving to Molalla in the early days, with her husband, she was a great factor in community life.

She maintained the old fashioned southern hospitality to the last. Her cheerful manner was a benediction to all who were fortunate enough to become acquainted with her. In her lodge and church life she kept a lively interest, which was almost youthful in its enthusiasm, to the very last.

She was a member of the Rebeccas and for many years has been a consistent member of the Church of Christ.

Her husband died several years ago at the age of 78. She was born in 1842. She outlived the allotment of three score and ten by eight years.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. R. P. Williams at the Thomas home on Friday. Interment was in the Odd Fellow cemetery. Undertaker H. N. Everhart was funeral director.

She is survived by two sons, John W. of Molalla and Charles H. B. of Burlington, Washington.

MRS. WADDELL LOSES LIFE IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Mrs. Evelyn Waddell, wife of Mr. Waddell, of Portland, a well known traveling salesman, recently lost her life in an automobile accident while on her way to Fargo, N. D., from Yellowstone National Park.

Mrs. Waddell was in company with her husband and little daughter, Evelyn when the accident occurred, shortly after leaving the Yellowstone park. Mr. Waddell, who was driving the automobile, saw ahead of him a piece of road which was wet and where an irrigation ditch had overflowed. Believing that the road was only wet on the surface he drove his car over it, but the water no doubt had been of long standing in the road, for the automobile sunk to the radiator, causing the car to turn completely over. The occupants were thrown out. As soon as Mr. Waddell crawled from under the car he heard his little daughter crying, and rushing to her side found her leg to be lacerated and badly bruised. He next turned his attention to his wife, who was lying close by, and thinking she had been rendered unconscious he rushed for aid. When a physician was consulted he found Mrs. Waddell was dead, her neck having been broken by the fall.

Mrs. Waddell was well known here, having been employed as confidential secretary for the Hawley Pulp & Paper Company for over a year.

Mrs. Waddell has a sister, Mrs. Jones, residing near Oak Grove.

The proceedings in the local court were directed by E. J. Noble and Joseph E. Hedges, who were assisted in the Polk county court by James T. Burdette, Esq., and in the San Francisco court by Wm. B. Bosley, who was three years in Yale University with Mr. Hedges, and who was personally known to and closely friendly with him.
