

CANBY AND SOUTHERN CLACKAMAS

Canby Display at Fair Wins Premium

CANBY, Sept. 23.—Canby deserves much credit in the booth planned and carried out at the Clackamas county fair. This is the first time that such an exhibit from this community has been made so well, and the women taking an active interest in arranging the display showed much artistic taste. There were various kinds of canned and fresh fruit and vegetables, and various other articles that won the first prize over the Hazelia booth, as there was a close competition. The first prize was \$75 and the second \$50.

Carl Joehnk, one of the big boosters for this section of the county, is receiving much praise in the manner in which he worked for the interest of this display, as well as for the excellent showing made in the general display, where the farmers and residents of this section of the county came in for their share of blue ribbons.

Grain Threshing Is Delayed by Rains

CANBY, Sept. 23.—Henry Drier, who has been in charge of a threshing crew for 33 days' threshing, has returned to Canby to resume his position with the White garage until the weather is more favorable for completing his threshing. There still remains a considerable amount of grain to be threshed in several sections of the county.

Mr. Drier says the quality of all grain that his crew threshed was very good, and the wheat in some sections went as high as 40 bushels to the acre, while the oats as high as 60 bushels to the acre.
