COX HOPES GERMANY WILL ENTER COVENANT

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Sept. 29.—The league of nations was the major theme of an address here today by Governor Cox. He also played the "senatorial oligarchy," and renewed his charge of "widespread purchase and absorption of democratic and independent newspaper by 'reactionary interests.'"

On the stage here with Governor Cox were Brockbridge, Long, democratic candidates for United States senator and many other state candidates.

In opening his address, Governor Cox contrasted his attitude toward persons in his audience who asked him questions, with the arrest in Baltimore of a man who asked Senator Harding last Monday.

Senator Harding's questioner, Governor Cox said, found himself in "tail" because he asked a presidential candidate a question.

The speaker invited questions from league opponents, adding, "I assure you that you will not be locked up for it."

The governor reiterated expressions of sympathy for the German people and for those of German blood, who he said, had suffered because of the acts of German junker. The candidate also reiterated the hope that Germany would enter the league.

The governor made another demand for publication of a letter which he said Senator Harding had written to Senator Johnson of California containing "assurances" of opposition to the league.

LEGION ADOPTS RESOLUTION FOR JAP EXCLUSION

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Sept. 29.—The American Legion convention today adopted a resolution favoring excluding Japanese immigrants and "picture brides" from the United States and the cancellation of the "gentlemen's agreement" with Japan in respect to immigration.

The measure as introduced charged that the "gentlemen's agreement" was being constantly violated and that increasing numbers of Japanese are crossing the border into the country.

An uproar followed introduction of the measure. It was sponsored by the California and other western delegations and the delegates from Haiti.

New York delegate, attempted to have the matter put over for another year and they were howled down.

Colonel Milton J. Foreman, Illinois, sprang to his feet with a motion that the "United States immediately prepare to meet the Japanese menace." His motion was lost in the uproar and was not acted upon.

The spokesman for the South Carolina delegation made a dramatic speech in favor of the measure, declaring that the South fully appreciated the race problem confronting the Pacific coast. A tremendous cheer greeted the termination of his speech and the vote to adopt the resolution rolled up on the stage in an ear-splitting roar.

MONTANA DEMOCRATS ARE TAKEN OVER BY NON-PARTISANS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—That the non-partisan league had taken over the democratic party in Montana, was the declaration of Senator Myers, democrat, of that state, who in a formal statement issued here Monday urged Montana democrats to support the republican congressional and state tickets with the exception of the nominee for attorney general.

"There is no reason," said Senator Myers, "why the democratic party of Montana should be swallowed by a hybrid combination of radicals and revolutionists, bent on ruin; and there is no reason why a democrat should swallow their nondescript ticket. I refuse to do so."

"This action may sign my political death warrant. I would a thousand times rather retire to private life than to continue in public life at the price of betraying my state into the hands of what I consider the worst elements of politics and tuning it over to a carnival of recklessness and orgy of such radicalism as has prevailed in North Dakota for several years."

Senator Myers explained that the non-partisan league had obtained the democratic nominations in his state by entering its candidates as democrats in the recent state primary. The senator said that while his condemnation did not apply to the democratic nominee for governor personally, he could not "stand his backers and associates."

Revenues Indicate Island Prosperity

HONOLULU, T. H., Sept. 28.—Statistics for the fiscal year ending June 30 indicate that 1920 will be the most prosperous in the history of the islands. Exports have been the largest ever. Sugar alone up to July 1 exceeded last year's shipment by \$42,000,000. The total value of sugar shipped from the islands to the mainland for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1920, was \$118,961,556 as against \$75,511,738 for the year ending June 30, 1919.

Canned pineapples reached a total value of \$18,869,449 as against \$11,929,611 for 1919. Fresh pineapples exports jumped from \$16,057 in 1909 to \$32,949 this year. Bananas are from \$89,118 to \$138,192 during the 12 months. Canned fish rose from \$149,491 to \$279,380; rice exports rose from \$168,048 to \$208,590. The exports of honey, coffee, sisal fibres and molasses declined.

CLACKAMAS ENTRIES WIN FIRST PRIZES AT STATE FAIR

CHICAGO, Sept. 25.—Two more members of the Chicago White Sox confessed today to charges that they connived to "throw" the 1919 world's series to Cincinnati for a bribe of \$100,000. They are Claude "Lefty" Williams, pitcher, who told his story to the grand jury, and Oscar "Happy" Felsch, centerfielder, who admitted his part in the gigantic plot.

It was reported that George "Buck" Weaver, another of the eight players under indictment, was preparing to go before the grand jury and make a clean breast of his alleged connection with the scandal.

Williams went before the grand jury with his confession after he had conferred with Attorney Alfred S. Austin, counsel for the White Sox, and with Judge McDonald of the criminal court. Besides corroborating the story previously told the grand jury by Eddie Cicotte and Joe Jackson, who confessed yesterday, Williams' admissions are said to have involved several gamblers whose indictment according to Harvey Repplog, assistant state's attorney, is to be asked of the grand jury.

The confessions of Felsch and Williams were the climax of today's developments in the sensation that rocked organized baseball. They were the outstanding facts in a day filled with rumors.

SERIES OF DEBATES ARE SCHEDULED ON LEAGUE OF NATIONS

A series of debates on the League of Nations covenant has been arranged between Oscar D. Eby, democratic proponent, and William M. Stone, Jr., republican, who speaks against the pact. Both men are prominent local attorneys and debated the question before a packed house at the local commercial club here last Saturday night.

The schedule of meetings, which will thoroughly cover Clackamas county, follows: Oak Grove, Tuesday, Oct. 5; Canby, Thursday, Oct. 7; Springfield, Saturday, Oct. 9; Wilsonville, Wednesday, Oct. 13; Oswego, Thursday, Oct. 14; Marquam, Saturday, Oct. 16; Molalla, Tuesday, Oct. 19; Colton, Thursday, Oct. 21; Estacada, Saturday, Oct. 23; Logan, Tuesday, Oct. 26; Damascus, Thursday, Oct. 28, and Sandy, Saturday, Oct. 30. All of the meetings are scheduled to open at 8 o'clock in the evening.

Hotels of Chicago May Drop Prices

CHICAGO, Sept. 28.—Further steps to reduce prices were expected here today.

Chicago hotel men were to meet to consider reductions in the cost of living. Russell J. Poole, directing the city's fight to lower prices, was prepared to point out to the hotel men alleged discrepancies between the cost and selling prices of food listed on their menus.

"I think we will have no trouble showing 50 cents is too much to charge for 1 cent's worth of tomatoes and that 60 cents is more than 2 cent's worth on the cob is worth," said Poole.

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
