There is always a chance that a drop of the battery solution will splatter, though care in using the hydrometer may make the danger of damage extremely remote.

"In case the unexpected should happen," says C. H. Hilgers, Willard Service Station Dealer, "you can protect yourself if you have a small bottle of ammonia handy in the garage. If put on promptly, the ammonia may save a suit of shoes or a bad spot on the running board of your car."

"Ammonia can also be used to clear corrosion from connections and battery terminals."

World War Hero Is Laid To Rest

The funeral services of the late Newton Moak, son of W. H.
