Underwriters

Disapprove of

Hill Park Site

If the new fire truck purchased by Oregon City at a cost of \$13,000 and due to arrive here in a few days, is located on the hill the expected reduction in insurance rates will be denied, according to a statement made here Friday by James H. McCune, manager of the Underwriters Rating Bureau, of Portland.

McCune came to Oregon City Thursday at the request of the interests that are attempting to have the new city hall, which will house the fire apparatus located on McLaughlin Park, near the top of Singer Hill, and after making an examination of the proposed site and an investigation of the fire hazards, declared that he could not give his approval to the McLaughlin Park location.

The statements especially interesting at this time when the site is a debatable situation. Early this year, when the campaign for the fire truck bonds was in progress, Mr. McCune made a written statement to the effect that a general reduction of approximately seven per cent in fire insurance rates in Oregon City would be made should the city acquire a 1000-gallon capacity triple-deck pumper and locate it at a place approved by the Bureau.

McCune now states that the quarters for the new apparatus must be in the business district, else the promised reduction will not materialize, and his assertion has knocked the props from under the people who have submitted to the people at the November election a petition asking that the city hall building shall be located in the Park. There is a remote possibility that the petition will be withdrawn, it is understood.

CLOTHING NEEDED.

A few days ago an appeal for old clothing was sent out by the local branch of the American Red Cross for a number of poor and sick families of this city.

One instance where the clothing is needed is a father very ill with lung trouble, with five children ranging from an infant to the ages of four, seven and ten years, and the mother trying her best to keep the little family together. They are making their home in a shack without windows to allow any light to the little ones, and Miss Cis Barclay Pratt, representing the local Red Cross Branch has taken what clothing has been offered for the needy family to their home, but finds there is not a sufficient amount donated. Anything in the way of provisions are also asked. If those having donations to make are not able to send them, should notify Miss Pratt, she will have these called for and taken to the needy family, and others in need.

SOLDIERS HOMEWARD BOUND.

HONOLULU, T. H., Sept. 30.—Some 1200 Czech soldiers and 170 Hungarian prisoners of war are on board the U. S. army transport Heffron, here now on their way home.

Wheat Prices

Canadian farmers last year got about 45 cents a bushel more for their wheat than was received by the farmers of the United States. How it came about is rather an interesting story. The price of wheat in the United States was fixed at \$2.26 per bushel. The Canadian price was fixed at \$2.15 per bushel.

Apparently the farmer of the United States had the advantage, but the Canadians organized their wheat program in such a way that whatever profit the government might make out of it would go to the men who grew the wheat and not to the speculators and profiteers.

Here is the way they worked it. When the Canadian farmer took his wheat to the elevator or mill he was paid the minimum price of \$2.15 in cash. Then, in addition, he was given a certificate showing the number of bushels of wheat he sold. This was called a participation certificate. The government then took over the wheat and marketed it during the year to the best advantage possible and at the end of the year figured up the results and found that it had a profit of about \$90,000,000. This profit was distributed among the farmers in proportion to the amount of wheat each had sold. When the whole thing was figured out it was found that the participation certificates were worth about 45 cents a bushel.

In other words, the Canadian farmer got his basic price of \$2.15, and then an additional dividend of 45 cents a bushel. That shows the difference between running things to protect the interests of the producer and permitting the speculator and profiteer to feed on the producer.

REPUBLICAN FRICTION IS DENIED BY W. HARDING

MARION, O., Sept. 30.—Senator Harding taking note of democratic charges that progressivism and the league of nations have created friction among republican leaders, said tonight that he was confident of the support of a united party on both issues.

He characterized as "absolutely untrue" published reports that Senators Johnson and Borah, of the treaty irreconcilables, had informed him that they soon would withdraw from the campaign and at the same time he announced that former President Taft and Herbert Hoover, two leading republican advocates of ratification, soon would be taking an active part in the fight for election of the republican ticket.

Commenting on the appeals of Governor Cox for progressive support, the republican nominee declared he had information convincing him that "the rank and file of the supporters of Roosevelt are putting their full faith in our cause." He made public with his endorsement a telegram to the governor from Charles Sumner Bird of Massachusetts, a former leader of the Roosevelt progressive party, declaring that known progressive sentiment was "a complete refutation of democratic assertions."

Discussing informally the league issue, Senator Harding said he never had given privately or otherwise to any republican leader any statement of his position on the league which had not been contained also in his public utterances. His stand, he said, was known in every detail to the public and was commanding the united support of republicans.

PRICES ON AUTOS AND SUPPLIES TAKE DROP

CHICAGO, Sept. 30.—Clothing, pianos and plumbing supplies are the latest commodities to join in the downward movement of prices here.

Maurice L. Rothschild, owner of a large retail clothing house, announced that a reduction of from 20 to 25 per cent has been made in the price of men's clothing and that further reductions are probable.

Lyon & Healy today advertised a general average reduction of \$109 in price of all styles of pianos.

The Goetz Brass company, extensive dealers in plumbing supplies, announced a reduction of from 10 to 25 per cent in the price of brass goods, effective October 1.

But cigar store owners declared today that "smokes" will not be reduced in price for at least two years. Increases in prices of approximately 15 per cent were announced by dealers recently and these prices, the dealers assert, will stand.

TOLEDO, Ohio, Sept. 30.—Plants of the Willys Overland company, automobile manufacturers, are closed today, throwing 4500 men and women out of employment.

Employees were instructed to report next Monday when it will be definitely known whether the plant is to operate on a three-day basis or remain closed until conditions improve.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Sept. 30.—Prices of two Cleveland cigs, the Cleveland and Chandler, have been reduced. It was announced today, the Chandler will now sell at \$200 less than formerly and the Cleveland at \$150 less.

PORTLAND, Sept. 30.—One of the first moves for the cut of food prices in cafeterias was made effective today by the Imperial Dairy lunch in its three eating places in the heart of the high rent district of Portland. A reduction of 5 cents on most of the standard dishes was announced.

Raid Is Made On Sinn Fein Homes

DUBLIN, Oct. 5.—A number of military raids against property of Sinn Feiners were carried out here early today. The homes of Dr. Kathleen Lynn and Mrs. Sheehy Skeffington, at Rathmines, a suburb, were raided.

Two civilians were reported to have been killed by troops at Cullen and Tipperary for refusing to obey sentries' orders to halt.

Widespread damage was done at Ballingaree in a "black and tan" police raid in reprisal for an ineffectual attack upon the French Park barracks.

Tillamook County Juveniles Winners

SALEM, Or., Oct. 1.—In the boys' and girls' industrial club classes, Tillamook county won first place at the state fair yesterday and other counties placed in the following order: Polk, Multnomah, Wasco and Douglas.

Points were not considered as much from quantity and quality as in artistic arrangement. Governor Olcott, O. M. Plummer and A. C. Marsters, the latter a member of the state fair board, addressing the boys and girls of the department at the noon hour.

SUGAR VALUES SHRINK.

BOSTON, Sept. 30.—The drop in sugar prices caused a shrinkage in value of at least \$250,000,000, according to an estimate made by Attorney General Allen today by Edwin F. Atkins, an official of several of the largest sugar companies.

HACKETT GETS DEER.

Deputy Sheriff E. C. Hackett has proven that he is a "crack shot" from the trip he has been on in the mountainous section of Douglas county, where he went for deer, bringing back a large animal, and remembering some of his friends with son. He was accompanied by his son, E. A. Hackett, who secured two deer.

Old "Bounce," the big dog that Mr. Hackett usually takes along for his annual outing was left with a friend until the next hunting season, and the dog's yelps for his master could be heard for some distance after Hackett had left his home.

ESTACADA MAN ARRESTED.

George H. Davis, proprietor of a pool hall at Estacada, was arrested Tuesday by Sheriff Wilson on charges of intoxication. He was arraigned before Recorder S. E. Wooster and entered a plea of not guilty and was released on \$50 bail to appear later for hearing.

O'LEARY STARTS WALK.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Oct. 2.—Dan O'Leary champion walker, left Springfield for St. Louis today on the second lap of his walk from Chicago to Dallas, Texas. O'Leary is jaunting the 1100 miles, more or less, in celebration of his eightieth birthday.

DRY LAW DECLARED VOID

MANILA, Oct. 5.—The ordinance recently passed by the municipal board of Manila prohibiting the sale of liquor to American soldiers and sailors is illegal, according to an opinion handed down by the city attorney today. He characterized it as class legislation and an unwarranted interference with affairs of the United States army and navy.

The municipal board in enacting the ordinance alleged that soldiers and sailors, while under the influence of liquor, disturbed the peace.

LIFE SENTENCE GIVEN TWO FOR TAYLOR MURDER

PENDLETON, Or., Sept. 30.—Irvin Stoop and Floyd Henderson were this morning sentenced by Judge G. W. Phelps to life imprisonment for first-degree murder in connection with the slaying of Sheriff T. H. Taylor. The men indicted jointly with Emmett Bancroft, alias Neil Hart, sentenced to hang for the sheriff's murder; Kerby, alias Owens, and Laffeebean, alias Rathle, were found guilty by the jury last night after seven hours deliberation.

The jury recommended life imprisonment.

Motion for a new trial for Stoop and Henderson, made by Joseph D. Lavin, their attorney, was denied this morning.

The convicted men, who with the other four were in the sensational jail break July 25, are mere boys in appearance. Stoop is 18 and Henderson 21. They received their sentence bravely, but the sobs of their mothers could be heard in the court room. Their fathers were present also.

Trial of the remaining defendants, Elvie Kerby, alias Jim Owens, and John Laffeebean, alias Jack Rathle, was started today.

Mrs. Bridget Mosher Passes Away Friday

Mrs. Bridget Mosher died Friday night at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. A. Shobe, at 410 Third street, Oregon City.

Mrs. Mosher was born in Ireland June 21, 1842, and at the age of 14 years came to the United States, and has resided in Oregon City for some time, making her home with her daughter, Mrs. Shobe, since May. Mrs. Mosher's former home was at Boone, Iowa.

Eight children survive, and are Mrs. J. A. Shobe, of Oregon City; Mrs. Sadie Standley, and Lela Mosher, of Boone, Iowa; Mrs. Jennie Sanderson, of Davenport, Iowa; Lyle Mosher, of Ottumwa, Iowa; Walter Mosher, of Kansas City, Mo.; Edward Mosher, of Arthur, Nebraska; Alfred Mosher, of New York City, N. Y.

The funeral services are to be held from the funeral chapel of Holman & Pace, Sunday afternoon, at 1 P. M., with Rev. W. H. Potbury, pastor of the Baptist church officiating, and interment will be in Mountain View cemetery, where the remains are to be laid to rest beside those of her husband, who died in February 1920.

Seaman Lost In Wreck of Destroyer

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—One man was lost and one officer and four men were injured while the United States destroyer Goldsborough was crossing a sand bar outward bound from Tampico, September 30, the navy department announced today.

The Goldsborough has arrived at New Orleans and transferred the injured to a hospital there.

Pat A. Quette, seaman second class, of Dover, N. H., was washed overboard and his body has not been recovered, the report stated. Further details of the accident have not reached the department.

The destroyer Goldsborough was built at Portland early in the '90's by the Wolf & Swicker Iron works.

Prices of Milk In Seattle Drops

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 5.—To meet the competition of independent distributors who had already taken similar action, members of the Seattle Retail Milk Dealers' association this afternoon cut the retail price of milk to 14 cents a quart. The old price was 15 cents.

The new price, the association leaders said, will stand until the mayor's milk commission makes a decision in the price controversy between the milk dealers and the organized dairy farmers.

Dealers explained the cut was made for no other purpose than to meet competition, and that they had merely followed their custom of following up or down the condensary price of milk, which price was cut last week.

Bandits Hold Up N. Y. Restaurant

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—All the thrills and gunplay of the wild West accompanied the holdup of a Lenox avenue restaurant early today when 62 men and women were lined up against the wall and relieved of jewelry and money.

While one of the bandits stood guard, another menaced the patrons with two pistols while a third went through their clothing. The arrival of the police was followed by a gun duel with the robbers in the street outside of their restaurant. Many shots were fired, but no casualties were reported. The robbers got \$7000 in cash and jewels.

HUNTER ARRESTED

M. Barrell, of Portland, was arrested Saturday by Game Warden Meads on charges of hunting in the Multnomah county game reserve and was fined \$10 by Justice Stipp.

The arrest was made in Clackamas county as the man was arrested in that part of the reserve extending in to this territory.

LINER BRINGS \$7,500,000

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—The White Liner steamer Baltic, from Liverpool and Queenstown, arrived here today with gold bullion valued at \$7,500,000 consigned to American bankers.

Outside Ambrose channel last night the Baltic encountered a hurricane. She turned and ran out to sea until daylight today.

PORTLAND EXPORTS SHOW BIG INCREASE DURING PAST YEAR

PORTLAND, Oct. 2.—Exports from Portland during September, 1920, amounted to \$6,466,918, according to cargo manifests filed at the customs house and tabulated by the Merchants exchange. Compared with \$2,170,667, the value of exports for September, 1919, the figure for the month just ended shows an increase of \$4,296,251.

Nineteen vessels cleared from Portland during last month for offshore destinations. Seven of these vessels went to the United Kingdom, five to the west coast of South America, three to the Orient, two to Australia, one to Hamburg and one to the Mediterranean.

Wheat led all other commodities, both in quality and value. Of this cereal, 1,943,415 bushels were exported during the month and this quantity was valued at \$4,772,240. All but two cargoes of the wheat went to the United Kingdom. One of these was sent to South America and the other to Mediterranean ports.

Second place was taken by flour, of which 75,766 barrels were exported, valued at \$915,032.

Lumber sent to foreign destinations during the month amounted to 14,498,188 feet and was valued at \$458,523. Miscellaneous general freight exported in September had a declared valuation of \$300,963.

G.
