INTERESTING EASTERN TRIP IS ENJOYED BY DELEGATES TO LODGE

CANBY, Oct. 14.—Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Knight and son Bonford, who have been on an eastern trip, where Mr. Knight was a representative to the Sovereign Grand Lodge of I. O. O. F., have returned to Canby, having had a most delightful trip.

Mr. Knight took an active interest in the session, and was among those taking part in the parade when 10,000 members of the order marched. This was one of the greatest parades ever held in Boston. There were many handsome robes and suits worn among these being a lodge called the Puritan Lodge, an order of Massachusetts, when the women and men were at the parade. Among the reviewing stands was in charge of Calvin Coolidge, Republican candidate for vice-president, who is a member of the I. O. O. F. Lodge. He was cheered as the marchers passed his stand later on during the parade. Mr. Knight was honored when invited to sit in one of the reviewing stands. Mr. Knight was also honored by being placed on a committee.

Before returning to their home in Oregon Mr. and Mrs. Knight and son visited many historical places in Massachusetts and in other states. Among these places were the old home of Paul Revere from where he started on his famous ride. The old home has been purchased by an historical society and much of the furniture was that was used by the famous revolutionary. Other old fashioned furniture in correspond with the historical home has been added. They also visited at Mount Vernon, the supreme court room at Washington, D. C., which was designed by Lafayette after Greek models. The chair of the chief justice is in the center, with those of the eight associated on either side. Flanking about the walls is a series of busts of former chief justices. The Knight family, while in this room, sat in the president's chair.

While at Cleveland, Ohio, then visited the home of Warren G. Harding, Republican candidate for president of the United States, and also sat in the favorite chair of Mr. Harding, which is placed on the famous front porch. While there one of the guard's presented Bonford with a political button bearing the likeness of Mr. Harding, which the youngster highly prizes, as he comes from good old Republican stock.

There were but two days the party saw rain while on the trip, and as soon as they arrived here they found that Canby had been having her share of "mist."

HARDING NEEDS REPUBLICAN SENATE

Oregon Needs Protective Tariff.

As is generally known, the present Republican majority in the United States Senate is just one vote. Republican control of that body is, therefore, in jeopardy. It is the realization of this fact which is causing Oregon's Republicans to unite in support of the candidacy of the Republican nominee for United States Senator, Robert N. Stanfield. With a difference of only one in the present Senate, Republican voters have awakened to the fact that if they vote for George E. Chamberlain they may by that very act be turning the control of the Senate over to the Democrats. On the other hand, by electing Robert N. Stanfield it is possible that his single vote may give the Republicans control of the Senate, and thus put that body solidly back of Harding.

Oregon producers are fearful of the effect that the election of Cox and a Democratic Senate would have upon them. It is quite evident that under Democratic rule rival products of foreign origin would offer a serious menace to many Oregon products. If the American standard of living is to be maintained, Oregon farmers, livestock men, fruit growers, lumbermen and woolgrowers must receive a price for their products which will enable them to make a reasonable profit over and above the cost of production. They will be unable to obtain such reasonable profit, or any profit at all, unless a Republican administration is elected to levy protective tariff duties just high enough to save our producers from the ruinous competition threatened by Canadian wheat and lumber, New Zealand butter, Australian wool, Argentine corn, European beet sugar, South American meat and hides and Manchurian beans and peas.

To hamper a Republican President with a Democratic Senate flies in the face of the well accepted principle that governmental management should be centered, so that the people can correctly place the responsibility for success or failure. The feeling among Oregon Republicans is, therefore, becoming quite general that Harding, if elected, is entitled to the support of a Republican Senate and that therefore Oregon should elect the Republican Senatorial nominee, Robert N. Stanfield, to help back up Harding.

STAR WITNESS AGAINST WETS FEARS THREATS

CHICAGO, Oct. 13.—H. A. Sadler, former New York stock broker and principal government witness in the federal case against a \$3,000,000 whiskey ring involving Chicago public officials in a maze of allegations of bribery and intrigue, appeared at the federal building today asking to be placed under arrest, and told of threats against his life.

Sadler was visibly shaken when he gave himself up and demanded protection from federal authorities. "The gangsters," Sadler said, "are vicious enough to go any lengths to remove a witness against them. I've had my warning and I know they'll get me if they're given the chance."

After Sadler had told his first story to government officials he was released of his own bond, but premature disclosure of his identity brought him hurriedly before Special Investigator Frank D. Wilson with a request that he be locked in a cell. He was taken into custody and sent to a suburban town accompanied by government investigators.

THEORY OF LEAGUE IS DIFFERENT FROM FACT

MANCHESTER, N. H., Oct. 13.—President Wilson, in a speech at the peace conference, already the subject of widely published controversy between him and Senator Spencer of Missouri, declared that "if any covenants of this settlement are not observed, the United States will send her armies and navies to see that they are observed." Senator Borah of Idaho, asserted in an address here tonight.

"The controversy between Senator Spencer and the president has been interesting," said Senator Borah, "not so much because it may illustrate the fallibility of memory, but because it shows how this league looks when you view it in its practical workings. The moment you descend from the opalescent empyrean of theories to the world of concrete things it looks altogether different. So long as you confine yourself to the league on paper and dwell in the world of rhetoric everything seems well.

"But when you get down to the actual workings of the league, it seems harsh and autocratic and altogether objectionable. When they tell us that the league will bring peace, everybody wants peace and so favors the league. But when you turn from theory to fact and see that it obligates us to send our boys across the sea, our army and navy, it creates an uproar of disapproval and hastens explanations and denials. Yet that is precisely what the league in its practical workings means.
