Prominent Canby Woman Is Dead

CANBY, Oct. 21.—Mrs. Elizabeth Riggs, one of the prominent and highly esteemed women of Canby, died at her home Saturday evening, after a brief illness. Mrs. Riggs was stricken with paralysis Friday evening and failed to recover from the attack.

Mrs. Riggs comes from one of the old pioneer families of Oregon. She was born May 9, 1856, in Platte county, Missouri, and was the daughter of Joseph and Charity Offield. She crossed the plains with her parents when she was five years of age, arriving in Clackamas county, where she has since made her home, first settling near Macksburg, and later taking up her residence in Canby, where she has made many friends.

Mrs. Riggs is survived by a daughter, Mrs. J. Hess, of Canby, Wash.; a grandson, Albert Hess, who has made his home with his grandmother since a mere child; three sisters, Mrs. Emily Mathews, Mrs. E. Riggs, of Macksburg; Mrs. Cynthia Fox, and a brother, John Offield, the latter residing at Coquille, Oregon. Mrs. Riggs was married to A. W. Riggs, who survives her, many years ago.

Funeral services were held from the family residence Monday morning at 10 o'clock, with Rev. M. J. Morton, pastor of the Spiritualist church in Portland, officiating. Many friends attended the services from Canby and Macksburg. The floral tributes were many and beautiful.

The remains were laid to rest in the family lot in Canby cemetery, a large number of her friends following the remains to their last resting place.

FRENCH GOVERNMENT SENDS WAR CITATION TO HERO'S MOTHER

SANDY, Oct. 20.—Mrs. E. J. Mitchell has just received the war service certificate from the U. S. Marines Corps at Washington, and a citation paper from the French government which were mailed to her son Roy Mitchell who was killed while fighting a forest fire up the mountains two weeks after his return from the army. It is natural that Mrs. Mitchell should prize these papers above all other personal effects. Her mother-heart still yearns for her boy, it being hard for her to understand how he could go through Solonson's sector, St. Mihiel's salient, Champagne sector, the Meuse and Argonne sectors safely, recover from being gassed and come home only to be taken from her in two weeks. Her son Roy was one of the first of the Sandy volunteers, having enlisted in June '17. He belonged to the Sixth Machine Gun Battalion, U. S. Marines, under command of Major J. Waller. It was during the battle of Solonson's sector that Roy volunteered to carry water to the battlefield to relieve the suffering of the wounded. It was necessary to cross a grain field that was being swept by Germans and he carried canteens through the storm of shells, arriving safely and giving aid. For his bravery he was recommended for the Croix de Guerre. Everyone familiar with the big battles will recall the noble work of the 6th Machine Gun Battalion which precipitated itself in the attack of July 18, '18, near Vieux and powerfully helped to maintain the position that day. On July 19 it valiantly advanced on open ground under violent artillery and machine gun fire, resolutely supporting the attack launched against the reinforced enemy positions. This battalion showed wonderful courage in rapidly consolidating and holding the important position captured by the infantry that day. This treasured citation paper is signed "Petain." Mrs. Mitchell has three other sons who were also valiant soldiers in the war.

Chula Vista, Calif., Oct. 12, 1920. Editor of Oregon City Enterprise: Oregon City, Oregon.

I received the Oregon City Enterprise yesterday and it is the first Oregon newspaper I've seen since I left home August 29. Guess I am too far South as I've seen very little Oregon news in the San Diego papers. Of course I get plenty of letters telling of your overabundance of rain and mud, and am glad that I am out of it for the winter.

I am located eight miles from San Diego; eleven miles north of Old Mexico and one mile from the ocean. I have not seen a drop of rain since I left home; the ground here would even produce weeds unless it is irrigated; they grow acres and acres of celery, sweet potatoes, melons, alfalfa, garden truck, some figs and oranges, but the main crop grown here is lemons. You see lemons everywhere and they are beautiful trees. There is a big lemon sorting and packing plant across the street from my house. I rented a house right in the center of Chula Vista, a town with as many people in as Oregon City, but spread out over many acres of ground. The property belongs to Mr. and Mrs. Stout of Hoff, Oregon. I certainly like the climate here so far and adore so much sunshine. They certainly have a fine grade school here, have nine teachers and a cement building more beautiful than any high school I saw in Portland. There is a public library and many nice looking buildings here.

The rheumatism don't bother me so down here, think I'm getting better.

Harper, Or., Oct. 4.—(To the Editor.)—The writer is a merchant, doing business at Harper, Or. Harper is a town located in the center of the

headquarters ranch of Miller & Lux, the largest cattle outfit on the coast, if not in the United States.

Last week I ordered from Swift & Co., Boise, among other goods, a case of one-pound cans of corned beef. Today they came, and this was what we read:

Getting Taxes From the Timber Corporations.

STATE OF OREGON,

County of Clackamas.

I, D. F. Skene, being first duly sworn on oath depose and say:

That I am a resident of Oregon City, Clackamas County, Oregon, and am Secretary and Manager of the Oregon City Abstract Company, in Oregon City, Oregon, and am acquainted and familiar with the tax rolls of Clackamas County, Oregon and have made a personal examination of the same to obtain the information herein set forth.

That I have examined the tax records of Clackamas County, Oregon for the years 1912 and 1913, effecting the valuation of the timber owned by the Union Lumber Company and by E. S. Collins and the Weyerhaeuser Land Company and the Molalla Lumber Company.

That I find that the valuation of the Union Lumber Company in Clackamas County, Oregon for the year 1912 to be \$61,810.00 and for the year 1913 to be \$121,595.00, showing an increase of \$59,785.00.

That the valuation of the E. S. Collins Lumber Company for the year 1912 in Clackamas County, Oregon to be \$406,345.00 and for the year 1913 to be \$686,170.00, showing an increase of \$279,825.00.

That the valuation of the Weyerhaeuser Land Company in Clackamas County, Oregon, for the year 1912 to be \$169,740.00 and for the year 1913 to be \$537,345.00, showing an increase of \$367,605.00.

That the valuation of the Molalla Lumber Company in Clackamas County, Oregon, for the year 1912 to be \$98,600.00 and for the year 1913 to be \$116,685.00, showing an increase of \$18,085.00.

That the total increase of the four above named companies for the year 1913 was \$725,300.00.

That the total increase in value for the year 1913 over the year 1912 was due almost, if not entirely, to the timber cruise made by the County Court after 1912, which was available for taxation in 1913, of something over two and one-quarter million dollars. This computed on the basis of a tax levy of twenty mills, which was made by the County Court for the year 1913 would bring an increased revenue of twenty mills on two and one-quarter million, amount to \$45,000.00.

That the cost of the cruise to the County was \$41,000.00.

That the first years income from the cruise was \$45,000.00, showing a net gain to the county of \$4,000 for the first years assessment after the cruise was made and paid for; this on the regular county levy.

The amount of revenue since 1913 that Clackamas County, Oregon has gained, outside of the gain to the road and school districts, by reason of this cruise has been to the tax-payers approximately \$275,000.00, less \$41,000.00 the cost of the cruise.

Now, in addition to this every road and school district which has levied a special tax since the cruise has been made, have profited in proportion to the new valuation caused by the timber cruise.

The records show that the cruise was made by the County Court, consisting of R. B. Beatie, County Judge and W. H. Mattoon and N. Blair, County Commissioners.

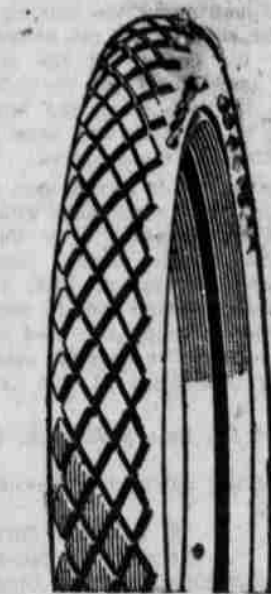
