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BRYAN URGES U.S. TO CANCEL HUGE EUROPEAN WAR DEBT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—William Jennings Bryan earnestly advocated cancelling the debt of \$10,000,000,000 owed the United States by England, France and the other former allies, in an address before the World Brotherhood federation, in convention here Thursday night.

The world must soon decide, said Bryan, whether it would become a "world of brothers or of brutes." Such action, he maintained, would be the first step toward universal reconciliation.

"Our nation," declared Bryan, "has now such an opportunity to relieve the world as no other nation has had before. The allies cannot pay without collecting the money from their former enemies. They could not collect this sum in addition to their own demands without sowing the seeds of a war more bloody than the one out of which we have just come."

"Our nation can use this debt to bring world peace, universal and perpetual. It cannot afford to cancel this debt on condition that the terms of the treaty are modified so as to bring the nations of Europe together in friendship and cooperation."

DEMOCRATIC TARIFF CAUSES BIG LOSS TO OREGON FARMERS

PORTLAND, Oct. 19.—"Importation duty-free from South America and Australia of hides has sent prices in this country lower than they have been in many years and is costing stockmen in eastern Oregon a lot of money. This is just another instance of the evil effects of the democratic Underwood tariff bill in eastern Oregon and another reason why voters of that section will roll up a huge vote for Harding for president and Stanford for United States senator," declared Julian A. Hurley of Vale, who was in Portland yesterday from Marshfield, where he attended the Knights of Pythias convocation.

Mr. Hurley is state senator from his district and past grand chancellor of the Knights of Pythias.

"The slogan, 'Back up a republican president with a republican senate,' is full of meaning in our section," he continued. "It means, to state it plainly, that unless Mr. Harding is backed up by a senate strongly under republican control, which will give us a protective tariff on our wheat, our cattle, our wool, our hides and other products, we will have very slim pickings for the next few years. A democratic senate would make a protective tariff impossible and without a tariff eastern Oregon producers face ruin. They simply cannot produce cattle, wheat, wool and hides in competition with foreign producers."

COAL PROFITING COST PEOPLE HUGE SUM SAYS SENATOR

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—Coal profiteering participated in by operators and railroads cost the people of the country at least \$350,000,000 during the last year, United States Senator Calder, chairman of the senate housing committee, declared today at a luncheon.

Many of the "political and financial evils," which confront the country, he added, are due to laxity on the part of the national administration. "The present housing shortage," he said, "was reflected in the 'wheat mismanagement' on the part of some one in authority in Washington in the handling of the railroad situation. The national administration, in this particular respect, he said, had 'failed lamentably.'"

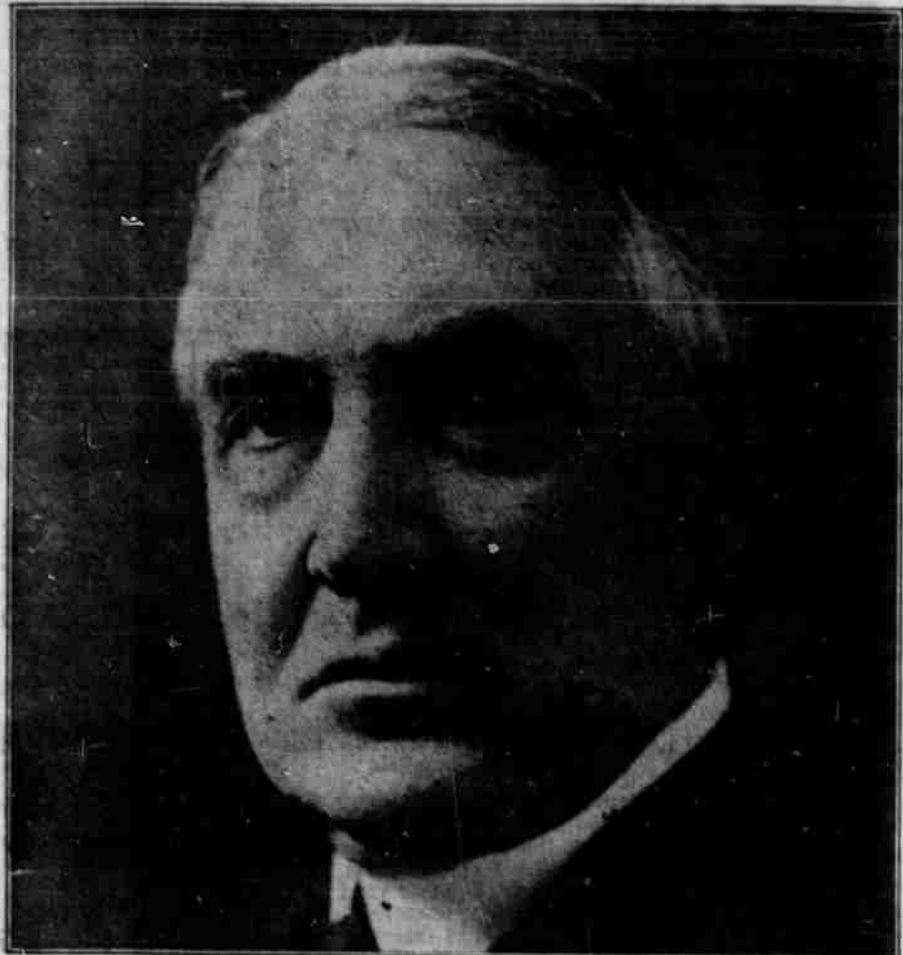
UNITED STATES BANK DEPOSITS SHOW BIG INCREASE FOR YEAR

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—Bank deposits in the United States increased \$4,045,164,000 during the year ended last June 30, said a statement issued today by Controller of the Currency Williams. Loans and discounts increased \$5,805,736,000.

Total resources of all reporting banks of the United States, not including federal reserve banks, were given as \$53,007,105,000. The capital, surplus and profits of all banks were reported at \$5,953,983,000, an increase since June 30, 1919, of \$618,203,000.

Mr. Williams said the total resources of all the banking institutions under state supervision as reported June 30 amounted to \$29,667,855,000, an increase for the year of \$3,287,326,000.
