Health Experts To Fight Tuberculosis

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Refined chaulmoogra oil, which experts of the government public health service say has arrested the progress of leprosy, will soon be used by them in the fight against tuberculosis. The experiments with tubercular patients will be conducted in Hawaii.

Dr. J. T. McDonald, superintendent physician of the leprosy investigation station in Honolulu, with Dr. A. L. Dean, chemist and president of the University of Hawaii, will start the fight against tuberculosis, while continuing their work against leprosy.

Unofficial reports from Honolulu quote Dr. McDonald as saying that scientists at the University of California have discovered that the fatty acids of chaulmoogra oil are bactericidal to an acid-fast bacillus, in which class are the leprosy and tuberculosis bacilli.

CLAIMED HOUSE DESTROYED.
