CANADA SETS PACE IN POPULATION INCREASE



ENGLISH WIDOW AND EIGHT STUDY GOING FIND NEW HOME IN CANADA

The most recently published population figures, issued in 1920, give the Dominion of Canada a population of 8,835,102. The 1911 census gave that country a population of 7,296,643. This shows a 22 1/2% increase for the intervening nine year period. In 1871, Canada's population numbered only 3,687,267, so that the increase in fifty years is almost 120%. This is by far the highest rate of increase experienced by any country.

According to the latest census, the United States made an increase of 14.9% in the decade just closed as against 21% increase in the decade 1900-1910. This considerable decrease is attributed, by the Census Bureau, to a falling off in immigration.

Other countries, such as the United Kingdom and France, that are almost wholly dependent on their birth rate for increase and where immigration is a negligible quantity, make little or no progress in swelling their population statistics. Few European countries reached a 5% increase in the past ten years. Annexation of territory and changing of boundaries effect unprecedented increases and decreases in some instances. But these are abnormal.

Canada's pace is unique. It is far ahead of the other British dominions in process of settlement, offering similar attractions and governed by like conditions. Australia records a population of 5,149,543, an increase of a little more than 17% over the 1911 census figures; New Zealand's 13% increase brings her number of inhabitants to 1,133,014, while the Union of South Africa increased its white population between 9% and 10% during the past eight years.

These figures are irrefutable evidence of Canada's popularity in the eyes of immigrants. According to a recent survey, the multitude of intending emigrants in the British Isles under the Overseas Settlement Scheme, declared themselves as being overwhelmingly in favor of Canada for their future home. It must not be forgotten that the 22 1/2% increase was made during the period when war brought immigration to a standstill. With the letting down of barriers and the resumption of steamship service, the tide of settlers is flowing in heavier than ever before, and to this must be added the continuous influx of settlers from the States. Canada's faith in her future and for greater increase in population is well grounded. A review at the end of 1920 will, no doubt, show figures hitherto unattained in the development of a new country.
