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EX-SERVICE MEN
AND WM. STONE
MIX OVER BILL

The local American Legion, in a meeting held Monday evening at Oregon City, passed a resolution condemning the alleged statements by Representative Wm. M. Stone on the soldiers state bonus bill, which will come up before the next state legislature.

Representative Stone, upon hearing of the adoption of the resolution made by the Legion, also has prepared a statement in his defense, which we herewith publish along with the resolution in question:

Resolution:
Whereas: Representative William M. Stone, of Clackamas county has publicly asserted his position, in regard to the proposed Oregon State Bonus bill, as being against the measure, and,

Whereas: Representative Stone has further asserted that he stands against any form of a bonus bill, and,

Whereas: Representative Stone gave the general impression, prior to his election, as being in favor of ex-soldier legislation, and,

Whereas: Representative Stone, in the opinion of this Post of the American Legion, has proved faithless to the votes of ex-service men

Resolved: That a copy of this resolution be given publicity in every Clackamas county newspaper and that a copy be sent to Representative Stone, with an invitation for his reply to this resolution.

Stone's Statement
(In reply to above)

"I have never declared my attitude toward the soldiers bonus bill. The resolution was passed without an attempt to learn what my views were concerning the same. I have favored a bonus to those who by their service to the country incurred a financial loss, if the same can properly be financed. I am opposed to a bonus to those who worked in the spruce camps and to those who saw only several months training in the camps.

"I believe that the soldiers who crossed the seas are entitled to favor in proportion to the sacrifice that they made, and that those who served at least six months at home should be considered. This bill will have to be referred to the people and of course will not be operative unless the people should pass the same.

"The only way the bill can be financed is by a bond issue and the State will have to take the money off from some other institution to meet the increased burden on the tax payers. I suggest that the Accident Insurance Commission be supported entirely by industry, and a saving of several hundred thousand dollars a year can thus be effected, which can be used toward financing the bill.

"If a bill is framed along the lines suggested, I shall vote to refer the same to the people, otherwise I shall oppose the same. I will say that I have never been approached by any one as to my views in this regard. I stated at the teacher's banquet recently held in Oregon City, that the soldiers were demanding a bonus, but I was careful to refrain from expressing my opinion as to the merits of their proposed bill."

The Unwelcome Immigrants

In the three weeks ending Nov. 20, the arrests in Japanese smuggling cases in Seattle alone numbered 26. The United States immigration officers have recently taken two men who are alleged to be agents of an international smuggling plot to slip Japanese laborers into the United States.

A California paper prints this news, and along with it states that Japanese newspapers of recent date have announced the completion of the new treaty between Japan and the United States, saying it was "acceptable to Japan."

People in three quarters of the country sometimes wonder why the Californians get so excited over their few Japanese farmers. The reason lies in just this appearance of double dealing by which Tokio ratifies gentlemen's agreements with the United States, while private Japanese citizens are engaged in vast designs to introduce their countrymen to our fat and fertile fields.

If Japan wants this country to trust her, the Japanese government itself must take a hand in the enforcement of its own agreements. So long as these pacts are constantly violated, by letter as in the case of smuggling the laborers, by spirit as in the case of the picture brides, just so long will the Coast states be discontented and fearful.

PORTLAND, Dec. 23.—Private Husted A. Walters was found guilty of murder in the first degree Thursday morning by the jury before which he was on trial charged with killing Patrolman Jerome Palmer. The jury made no recommendation as to penalty.

Under the law the death sentence or life imprisonment is left optional with the judge.

The case was tried before Circuit Judge Robert Tucker.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 23.—Edward (Knockout) Krivosky, pugilist and alleged criminal gangster, offered testimony in his own behalf today to break down a charge of having criminally assaulted Miss Jessie Montgomery of Reno, Nev., for which he is being tried here.

Krivosky, while admitting his presence in the house in which the attack took place, offered evidence to show that he had no definite knowledge of the occurrence.
