When Dr. Dedman was notified of the accident he misunderstood Mrs. Dozier, and thought she said her hus band had been shot in the head. Fearing the man would be dead before he arrived, he made haste to the home to find that it was a wound in the find that the shot had falled to even pierce a bone or muscle.
