# FARMERS POOL NEAR 23,000,000 **BUSHELS WHEAT**

SPOKANE, Wash., March 30 .- The Washington and Idaho Wheat Growers' association have signed up 17,-000,000 bushels of the 1920 wheat market in the two states to pool for market it was announced Tuesday by Bruce Lampson, organizer for the associations. This is an increase or 1,000,000 during the last two weeks.

Mr. Lampson announced that 6,000. 000 more bushels have been signed up in Oregon and Montana to add to the Pacific northwest amount, making a total of 23,000,000 bushels in this district.

The farmers are still signing con tracts to sell their 1921 wheat through the association, despite the fact that little effort has been made to secure more wheat in Washington and Idaho since April 1," said Mr. Lampson Tues "A number of our organizers have gone to Oregon to help get the growers of that state organized.
