An interesting illustration of the awakening of Spain to the benefits of motor omnibuses and trucks is prsented in an announcement from the General Automobile society that a competitive trial of motor busses and trucks was held recently from Barcelone to Madrid, 438 miles Specified distances had been laid out for six

The motor bus, reports United States Consul-General Hurst, at Barcelona has successfully solved the problem of communication in many districts of Spain not reached by the railways and the motor truck is rapedly replacing horse-drawn vehicles for long hauls over indifferent roads, as well as for general trucking in city limits.
