



The exposition, declared Chairman Meier, is a purely business proposition as far as the state is concerned. He characterized the proposed tax levy as a "tax reducing tax measure." "The state of Oregon," he said "is at present overtaxed. It is impossible to get more roads and institute more public projects unless the valuations

are increased, and there are more 2-B-Oswego Transfer people brought here to pay the taxes." This, said the speaker, the exposition would do. Millions of people would come to Oregon with the fair as their objective, many would stay and all would spend their money here. Thus the state would have the benefit of a great exodus of tourist trade which would place it another 25 years along the road toward better civilization and

For an outlay of \$5,000,000 he explained, the state would receive \$200, 000,000 in return.
