Grocery business is off about 25 per cent from normal. Collections are good. People are buying staples rather than luxuries and in the staple lines of beans, spinach, corn and sugar the prices have risen slowly.

The hardware business seems to be normal. One wholesale firm had a falling off last year of 10 per cent of its basiness, figured in dollars and cents, but the price decline was 20 per cent, showing that there was an actual increase in volume of 10 per cent. However, collections in the hardware business are from fair to poor. There have been no price increases in the hardware business.

An executive partner of a leading department store tells me that business figured from a dollar and cents standpoint is 12 per cent off from that of a year ago, but price declines are just about the same amount. Collections are a little slow, but they always are at this time of year, owing to the extra demand made upon the pocketbooks of the public during the holiday season. The price of textiles-that is to say, woolen, cotton and linen goods has increased. This merchant is quite optimistic over the situation. His store is having a good many demands for furnishing new houses and business in general seems to him satisfactory. Street Car Receipts are Indication

Receipts of the Portland Railway Light & Power Company are off from normal. Many people use the street car as a barometer of local husiness and from all the reports that we have received I would say that it is a pretty good index, because probably all of the different lines of business are off about 8 per cent or more.


