CLACKAMAS AUTO CO. HAS \$168,000 BLAZE

Burned to the ground by a fire of unknown origin, the Clackamas County Auto and Tractor Company, located in the Buck building at the corner of 11th and Main streets is a

The damage is roughly estimated at more than \$100,000. In less than a quarter of an hour the flames which broke out at 11:40 o'clock last night had the entire building beyond possibility of being saved. The oil and gasoline in the building and the inflamable character of the structure gave rise to an intense heat. The building itself was burned to the ground in less than an hour.

The individual damage, estimated last night is:

Clackamas County Auto and Tractor company, \$50,000. This loss is two-thirds covered by insurance.

Damage to private cars stored in the garage, \$35,000. Insurance unknown.

Busch building, \$15,000. Partially insured. Damage to Busch apartments, \$1,000. Damage to adjacent buildings, \$500.

The alarm was turned in at 11:45 o'clock. The flames are believed to have started in the driveway on the 11th street side of the building. The entire building was engulfed almost than if you work on the puzle alone. at once. When fire department arrived it was impossible for the men to enter, and they concentrated their efforts on saving the adjacent buildings.

Fire Chief Priebe was successful in confining the flames practically entirely to the one structure.

Concentration of two hoses on the gasoline tank which was buried in the front of the filling station to the south of the

building, prevented an explosion.

The fire was one of the most spectacular seen here in years. The oil gave forth white flames, visible as far as Port- follow land. During the first half hour, there was little wind and a number of the buildings in the immediate vicinity were jeopardized. At 12:30 a stiff south wind came up, blowing the flames against the Busch apartment structure and endangering the houses to the immediate north of 12th street.

Efficiency on the part of the fire department saved the

entire district from being burned.

Local officials who made a hasty investigation while the fire was at its height, were last night unable to ascribe any cause to the blaze. A permanent injunction, restraining Oregon City from building a city hall in McLoughlin park, was granted by Circuit Judge J. U. Campbell Saturday. The decision was made in the case of Mary Norris and Mary Caufield against Oregon City which was instituted in the local court last Au gust.

Failure to obtain the requisite numer of names on the petition to recall the unsold portion of the \$1,700,000 road bond issue precludes the possibility of the question being placed on the ballot at the forthcoming primary election. The petition as it now stands has 1245 names on it, this is 50 per cent less than the amount needed according to County Clerk Fred A. Miller. The clerk states that to put the petition in such a shape as to qualify it for the ballot the law requires that it be signed by 15 per cent of the county's voters or that it have in all 2496 signatures.

Besides the lack of names the petition was not filed within the prescribed time limit which in this instance should have been March 18 or sixty days prior to the election.
