

> Share of Southern Pacific **Railroad On Improvement** To be \$26,000 On Basis of Cost of Big Crossing.

FINAL DECISION UPON LINE IS STILL HELD UP

Financial Arrangements Are Assuming Shape; Route on Hill to Depend on Funds.

Detailed plans for the crossing with the Southern Pacific on the Pacific highway were completed yesterday by the state engineers, marking the con clusion of the engineering work prior to the determination of which route will be used by the South End road in Oregon City. The cost of the overhead will be \$65,000, it is computed.

The plane for the overhead on the basin route were necessary in order to definitely determine the proportion to be paid by the S. P. The railroad has agreed to contribute the share it would have to pay on the overhead to the cost of constructing the route over the hill which is favored by the highway commission. Under the state law the railroad is forced to pay 40 per cent of the cost of crossing structures. This would make their share \$26,000 toward the South End road.

The decision of the highway com mission is being held up pending the settlement of the finances between the corporations which are interested in the road. The effort to improve one of the hill routes will depend up-

on whether or not sufficient funds can be raised through the companies as neither the state or the county can improve the road within the city and there are no funds on hand which the municipality can expend for this work.
