Mrs. George DeBok, who is engaged in the poultry industry at Willamette, specializing on the White Leghorns, has a hen that has made an exceptional record since March 15, when she laid three eggs atatched to each other by means of a small tube, since that time laying a number of double yolk eggs. The largest of the three eggs produced at one time was of unusual size, while the one adjoining was of ordinary dimension. The third resembled a Bantam egg, Each egg had a well coated shell. This hen was hatched on August 1st, and layed her first egg on New Year's day, and she rarely missed a day in producing her share of egg food on the DeBok farm. Mrs. DeBok has 500 hens on her farm, and 300 baby chicks. The laying hens are averaging 300 eggs per day, and are marketed in Willamette and at West Linn.
