SINKS BRITISH STEAMER

PHILADELPHIA, May 23 .- The British cargo carrier Andree was rammed and sunk off Fort Mifflin by the H. F. Alexander, formerly the Great Northern, the fastest ship flying the American flag.

The captain and entire crew of 40 men of the Andree were rescued by the Alexander's lifeboats and tugs, the Philadelphia navy yard said.
