Intended Change In Rate Powers Decried By Club

Vigorous protests against the proposed legislation to curtail the authority of the Interstate Commerce Commission and place power to regulate interstate rates in the hands of the different public service commissions, is voiced by the local commercial club. In letters to senators and representatives at Washington with rheumatism for several months from Oregon, Ralph L. Shepherd, chairman of the transportation division of the Commercial Club, brands the projected changes as a misconception of the true operation of the pres ent laws and urges the defeat of the amendments.

The specific bills to which it is re-Mr. and Mrs. Henry Henrici enterferred are Senate Bill 1150, by Senator Capper of Kansas, and House Bill 6861, Representative Sweet of Iowa. They would amend sections 3, 13, 15 and 15A of the interstate commerce and transportation act of 1920.
