AMERICAN CONSULATE IN NEWCASTLE CLOSED

LONDON, Sept. 1.—The British government has canceled the exequatur of the American consulate in Newcastle and the American government has closed the consulate.

It is asserted that the Washington government has been furnished with proof that consular officials in Newcastle abused their position to the disadvantage of British interests, among other things having refused to issue British passports to the United States on trivial pretexts unless the holders of the passports agreed to travel on American vessels.
