TIMELY SERMON ON LIVE TOPIC. PASTOR EXHORTS TO BETTER AND LOFTIER THINGS AND TELLS THE WHY OF IT. WE SHOULD LIVE RIGHT EACH DAY. Excerpts From a Sermon By Rev. Zimmerman, Preached December 11—Heaven Not an Eternal Holiday. Rev. Zimmerman, of the M. E. church, speaking to the text—"As He Which Hath Called You is Holy so be ye Holy in all Manner of Conversation"—had the following to say in an excellent sermon of a recent date: In this verse of scripture the Apostle Peter, writing under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, has shown us the standard by which God measures the religion of individuals and of churches. Any individual opinions that we may have concerning the religious life and its duties, that are in conflict with this standard, are swept away, because this standard is divine. A good many people today would write these words something like this: "As he which hath called you is holy so be ye holy on Sunday and on prayer meeting night, but don't pay much attention to it at other times." This text is wide and all inclusive in its scope. God wants our religion to touch and purify every department of our life. He wants us to prove our faith by our words, and the best place to do that is not in the church on Sunday, but out in the field of business and industry. Many church members are not as diligent in their religious life as they should be. They want all the wealth and pleasure of this world that they can possibly secure, but of religion all they want is just enough to get through to heaven on. Everybody anticipates having a good time in heaven. The beauty and power of the religion of Christ, however, does not lie in what it promises to do for us hereafter, but in what it is able to do for us here and now.
