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WASHING MADE EASY.

A Woman Who Does the Work for Them Minutes.

Eighty-five dollars will pay for a washing machine of family size and will wash better than any woman can wash by hand. A good machine may perhaps be bought for even a little less. The machine is equipped with a wringer that is driven by power and a spin-dryer.

It is a day's work for the man and his wife and children to wash and wringer clothes. They are the man's business, says the advertiser.

How simple washing becomes. Some of the stories. Put the clothes in the machine. Turn a crank and let it do the work. Turn a crank and let it do the work.

Close the top to keep in the steam and shut and let it do its work. After a few minutes. They come back and turn of the power. Open the cover at the bottom and let out the dirty water. Let in clean water and run the machine over again. It will wash the clothes as well as the water.

Simply use the machine in a higher temperature and when it is hot turn on the water and the power. Instead of a tub, washing becomes a much more of an art than that of washing the clothes.
