WHEN WEST VETEOED DEFICIENCY BOARD MEASURE AND LAW FOR FURNISHING SUPPLIES. SALEM, Or., Feb. 24.—(Spl.)—Two vetoes that have not been altogether acceptable to those who know the inside workings of things here are those which the Governor disapproved of the bill providing for a deficiency board as also for the selling of supplies to the State.

As at present ordered any board create a deficiency and then it is up to the legislature to pay it or the creditors are left to hold the bag and the State given a black eye commercially. Under the terms of the new law there was to be a deficiency board, composed of the Governor, Secretary of State, Treasurer, Speaker of the House and the President of the Senate.

Governor West turned these two measures down, and it is thought in doing so that he at least did a good turn for his friends, whether or not he knows it.
