





MEETING SATURDAY IOCAL FRUIT UNION AND THEN GOES OUT TO TRIM APPLE TREES.

The meeting of the horticultural wing of the Oregon City Fruit ond Produce Union was held in the Court House Saturday afternoon, with the best attendance so far shown. County Frui tInspector A. J. Lewis was present and made an address. E. C. Ryall made a talk on grafting black walnuts. T. J. Gary discussed grafting crab apples and wild cherries. E. C. Ryall called attention to the

fact that grub worms were destroying currant bushes. A. J. Lewis suggested spraying in September with lime and sulphur, and that the secretary write the Oregon Experiment Station

in the matter. A. J. Hobble had sprayed gooseber ries for the green worm with arsen ated lead.

A. J. Lewis, in answer to inquiry said that there was no harm to a grown orchard to raise vegetables beween the rows; though the veget ables would suffer, however.

B. Kuppenbender spoke on the ben-efits of the Union and O. D. Eby on the future of the Union.

Mr. Lewis made the address of the day on the matter of spraying. After the address the audience adjourned to the Charman home across the street to see apple trees trimmed as an old tree should be treated. The tree was found to be suffering from scale and the attention of those present was called to its condition. In spraying Mr. Lewis said one wanted the proper sprays, at the proper time, in the proper manner and with thoroughness. The meetings of the Union are awakening the farmers of the county as they were never stirred up before and it is certain that much good will come from it. The meeting next Saturday will be at 2 o'clock.
