An Ordinance Defining Certain Duties of the Chief of Police Regarding the Collection of Licenses.


Sec. 1. It is hereby made the duty of the Chief of Police of Oregon City, to inspect the license of every person, firm, company or corporation, engaging in or carrying on any profession, trade, calling or occupation for which a license shall be required under Ordinances No. 207 and No. 323, of Oregon City, and if he shall ascertain that said person, firm, company or corporation so engaging in or carrying on such profession, trade, calling or profession, has failed to obtain a license as provided in said ordinan-ces aforesaid, the Chief of Police shall immediately collect the amount of such license due Gregon City and pay the same to the City Treasurer. The Chief of Police shall also make any and all collections of any and all licenses, fees and moneys which are and may become due Oregon City as the same may be required of him by the council Oregon City, and the said Chief of Police shall receive as sole compensation therefor, the sum of \$40.00 per month from and after February 1st, 1911.

Sec. 2. That Ordinance No. 356 of Oregon City, be and the same is hereby repealed.
