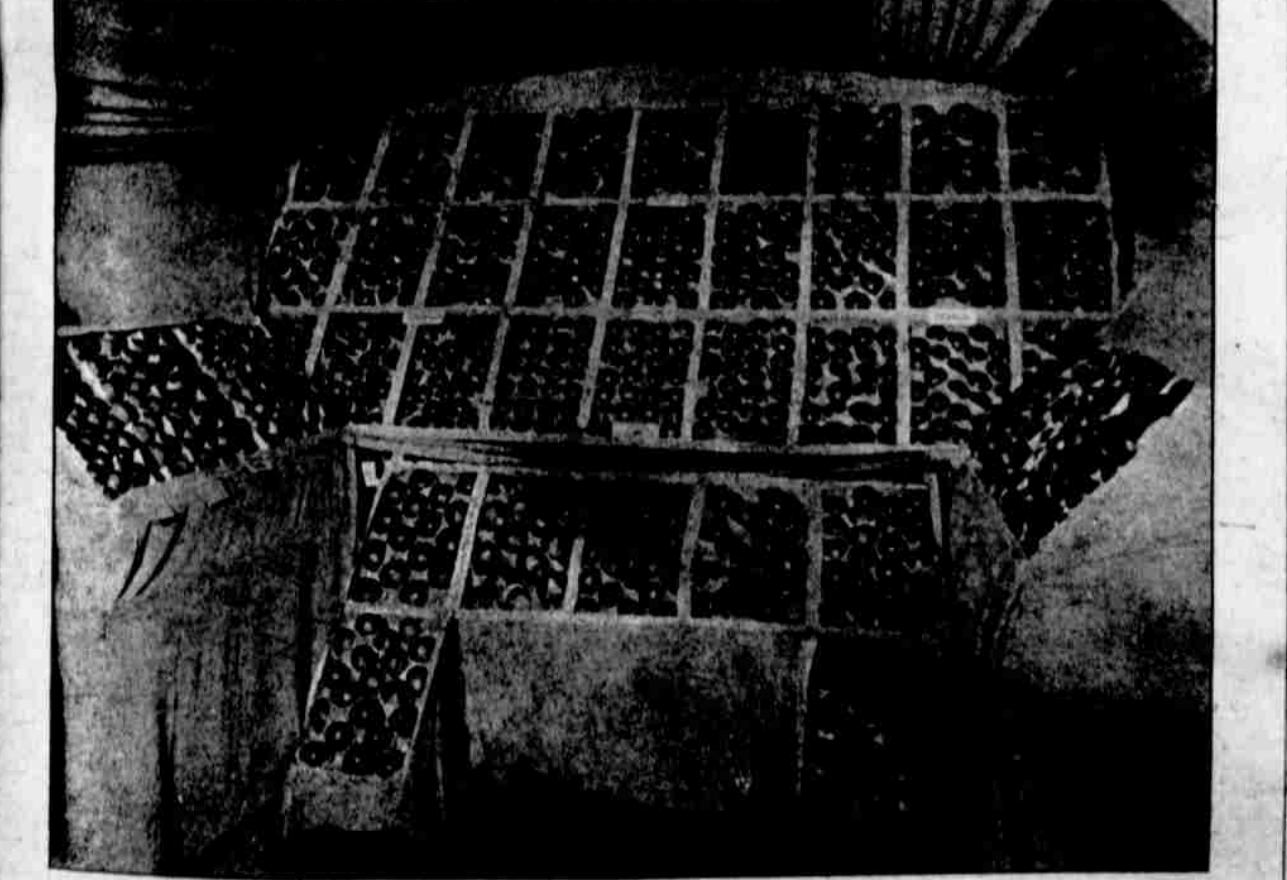
progressive, and a firm believer in the future of Oregon City.
