HENRY WADSWORTH LONGFELLOW—American poet.



perhaps the most popular of all poets here and abroad during his career. Born Portland, Me., Feb. 27, 1807; died Cambridge, Mass., March 24, 1882. Was graduated from Bowdoin college in 1825. Professor of modern languages at Bowdoin, 1825-30. Professor of modern languages and belles-lettres at Harvard 1830-54. Published many volumes of poems, beginning in 1830 with "Voices of the Night." Among his most noted long poems are "The Song of Hiawatha," "Evangeline" and "The Courtship of Miles Standish." His shorter lyrics, such as "A Psalm of Life," "The Children's Hour," "The Bridge" and "The Day is Done," are widely known.

BRYAN SEEKS PLACE AT HEAD OF TICKET

WASHINGTON, April 12.—(Special.)—It is the general belief that Wm. Jennings Bryan wants the nomination for President on the Democratic ticket in 1912, and that he feels that he ought to have it. And it is generally believed that he feels that he can come nearer being elected than any other Democrat. And the truth is that Bryan can point to the fact that Parker made a poorer showing than himself. Now things are considered different; there is a fair prospect now and as Bryan has been the "goat" three times, he thinks it is only fair to give him a chance. And it is probably only fair to admit that Bryan has the confidence of a larger number of conservative men now than ever before.

KENYON CHOSEN SENATOR. DES MOINES, Ia., April 12.—Judge William S. Kenyon (Republican) was elected United States Senator to succeed the late Senator Jonathan P. Doliver, on the 67th ballot this afternoon. The victory was on the second ballot of today's session, and following a stormy session. He received 78 votes just enough to elect, against 26 for Supreme Court Justice Horace Demer his Republican opponent.
