

TO ABDICATE MAY 5 PLAN PRES. DIAZ

THE VICE PRESIDENT CORROL CHARGED WITH BEING HIS CABALLISTIC PARTNER.

WILL RETIRE AND RESCIND PROMISE

Address Prepared for the Occasion Claim Made—Anniversary of Diaz' Great Victory Over French.

MEXICO CITY, April 21.—(Special.)—Rumor has it that Diaz will resign on May 5. It is said that when Vice President Corrol arrives in Europe, which will be in a few days, he will cable that his health is not good as he had hoped and that in view of this he is forced to retire from active life.

Diaz has shown many traits of loyalty to the Mexican people and this may be the supreme sacrifice that is to be asked of him. May 5 he is planning to review the Mexican troops at Puebla, where he made his memorable victory over the French, and as the day will be the anniversary of that event he may choose to, in the shadow of that great victory, resign and retire to private life.

It is said further in this connection that Diaz has a farewell address prepared for this occasion, and that he will deliver this with great eclat and then abdicate. If he carries out this program it is said that he will at once become the most popular man in the Nation. To prove that he has no grudge he this morning pardoned a number of prisoners, among them being several Americans.

INSURGENTS DEMAND

One-fourth of the Committee in the Senate—Vote 7 to 4 Against. WASHINGTON, April 21.—(Special.)—The first real outbreak of the Insurgents in the Senate came today. At a meeting of the Senate committee on Finance, headed by the Insurgents, headed by Mr. Follette, made a demand that they be given representation on the committee in proportion to the noses they count, being about one-fourth of the total. The proposition was defeated by a vote of seven to four.

At that the Insurgents forced a vote on the proposition. The statement was given out that the fight is to soon take shape over the proposition as to whether or not Taft is to be the candidate of a united party.

MAY GO TO PEN.

Governor West Said to Be Unwilling to Save W. Cooper Morris. SALEM, Or., April 21.—Governor West refuses to interfere in the judgment of the Circuit Court of Multnomah County sentencing W. Cooper Morris to six years in the penitentiary, according to statements given out by his private secretary this morning. The Governor has concluded to make no attempt to alter the sentence imposed for the reason that he believes the banker has had a fair and just trial, and was found guilty of a criminal offense. Morris will not be compelled to enter the prison until after the mandate from the Supreme Court is sent down to Portland, which, the court believes will be prepared for return next Wednesday.

GOVERNOR WEST AT HIGH SCHOOL

CHIEF EXECUTIVE SPEAKS IN FORUM BEING INTRODUCED BY MR. TOOZE.

TALKS TO STUDENTS AS A STUDENT

Board of Education and School Patrons Are Present in Honor of This Distinguished Visitor.

Governor Oswald West went out of his way Friday morning and delivered an address to the associated students of the Oregon City high school. This is the first time the Governor has ever talked to a body of school pupils and he expressed himself as hugely delighted over the experience and at the hearty reception he met from students, teachers and members of the Board of Education alike. The executive did not indulge in flights of oratory, but simply talked to the boys and girls about his own school life, which ended in the eighth grade. He told them of the practical value of an education, especially in public life, and urged them to have high ideals and strive for what is best in life. His talk was given the closest attention and he was cordially welcomed.

O. D. Eby, represented the Board of Education, and he impressed upon the students the value of the Governor's remarks. City Engineer Noble also talked briefly, both speakers talking entertainingly to the high school students. City Superintendent Tooze introduced the Governor.

The Governor and members of the Board of Education were entertained at luncheon, after which the guest of honor was taken about the city in an automobile. He made a close inspection of the historic home of Dr. John McLoughlin, the founder of Oregon City, which was recently restored, and said he had been glad to give his approval to the bill which carried an appropriation to assist in restoring the home. The Governor then met E. G. Canfield, cashier of the Bank of Oregon City and president of the McLoughlin Memorial Association and left for Portland early in the afternoon.

During his stay in the city he commented upon the fact that the new Secretary of State, Ben W. Olcott, had worked as a laborer for \$1 per day, in Oregon City in 1892, when Main street was paved with brick. Olcott came to Oregon from Illinois and had 25 cents in his pockets when he landed in Oregon City.

Governor West extended an invitation to the high school students to come to Salem and visit the State House and State institutions and it is probable that arrangements will be made in a short time so that the students can avail themselves of the invitation.
