

## INDICTED, CHIEF COX RESIGNS

MAYOR SIMON EXPRESSES APPROVAL OF CHIEF'S ACTION—COX DENIES GUILT.

### COURT RETURNS INDICTMENT AT 2:30

Accused of Permitting Dives to Operate Without Interference—Claims Others Blame Him to Shield Themselves.

PORTLAND, Or., April 29.—(Special)—Indicted for malfeasance in office this afternoon by the county grand jury, Chief of Police Cox will tomorrow tender his resignation to Mayor Simon.

The indictment, which was returned at 2:30 this afternoon, charges in brief that the chief permitted certain disorderly houses to operate without molestation. In speaking of his indictment this afternoon Chief Cox said, "I am not guilty of the charge made in the indictment. I am the victim of circumstances; that is, I have done my duty as I have seen it, but others have sought to blame me for things to shield themselves."

Mayor Simon approved the action taken by Cox and will accept his resignation.

### SCHOOL TEACHERS IN WRECK.

Excursion Train Goes Over Bank Killing 100.

EASTON, Pa., April 29.—A train carrying a school teachers excursion from Utica, N. Y., to Atlantic City jumped the track at Martins Creek, N. J., eight miles north of here this afternoon.

One are reported over the bank and lands. It is estimated that 100 are killed.

Railroad officials are summoning medical help from all points.

### NEW YORK TO REBUILD CAPITAL.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 29.—The state architect has approved plans for the rebuilding of the New York State Capitol. The plans involving an expenditure of \$9,000,000 are now before the State Trustees of Public Buildings for their approval. A group of buildings will replace the single building that was destroyed.

### PUBLICITY PLACE IS BADLY NEEDED

### COMMERCIAL CLUB STILL HAS PLAN TO ERECT STRUCTURE ON MAIN STREET.

### PRESENT QUARTERS OUT OF WAY

### Department Has Only One Room On Fourth Floor and Hundreds of Visitors Never See Display of Products.

The Publicity Committee of the Oregon City Commercial Club will probably determine next Tuesday whether to proceed with the construction of the proposed exhibit pavilion which is to be placed on the Westward promenade across the street from the court house.

For some months the committee has had this matter under discussion as it has been recognized for more than a year that the publicity work of the Commercial Club is being conducted at a great disadvantage, owing to the inaccessibility of the publicity headquarters which have been maintained on the fourth floor of the Masonic Building ever since the publicity department was organized two years ago.

The committee has only one room and is consequently unable to display the products of Clackamas County where they may be seen by visitors and the program of the committee has been hampered to a very great extent as a result.

Among some advantages of a publicity headquarters on Main Street is the permanent exhibit of the products of Clackamas County which will be maintained in the exhibit room. This exhibit will be where people can find it that are looking for it; also where people can see it who happen to pass that way. It will be a means of stimulating an interest among the farmers of the county to grow better crops as the Commercial Club will ask the farmers to exhibit their fine fruits, etc., in this display room.

This proposed promotion office will be a general information Bureau maintained by the business men of Oregon City for the aid of visitors to the city, prospective settlers, etc. In this way the advertising manager of the Commercial Club will be in a position to meet the people who come to this county through the efforts of the club and advise with them and assist them in starting their new home.

At the present time the Commercial Club is spending a great amount of money in advertising to bring people to Clackamas County. They are coming every day, but some are leaving on account of their cold reception to the town. With this office where it could be found by all, the newcomers would feel at home and with the assurance that the Commercial Club had an interest in him, he would be more inclined to locate here.

The business men of this city are interested in the erection of the proposed office and display room and realize the benefits to be derived therefrom and no doubt the publicity committee will order the erection of the

building at once so to have the same in readiness to meet this summer's immigration.

### PARKPLACE WINS DEBATE.

Affirmative Gets Decision Over Estacada High School. Parkplace won the joint debate Friday night between the Parkplace high school team and the Estacada high school. The debate took place in the auditorium of the Parkplace high school and was well attended by patrons and friends of the school. The question for debate was "Resolved, that life imprisonment, with restricted power of pardon should be substituted for capital punishment in Oregon." Parkplace took the affirmative and won the debate by the unanimous vote of the judges, County Superintendent Gary, John W. Loder and Professor L. A. Read, of Portland. The Parkplace debaters were Fay French, Kenneth Hendricks and Henry Leuenberger, and the Estacada team was composed of Russell Betts, Malcolm Wardle and Kitty Reagan.

ESTACADA PRINCIPAL SAID TO HAVE USED INFLUENCE TO SHUT OFF OREGON CITY.

### TOOZE FILES VIGOROUS PROTEST

Local Debating Team Refused An Opportunity to Try For Championship of Clackamas School League.

Declaring that H. M. James, principal of the Estacada school, used his influence and position as head of the debating department of the Clackamas County School League, to shut the Oregon City high school out of a chance to fight for the championship, Fred J. S. Tooze, superintendent of the Oregon City schools, has filed a protest with the officers of the league against any team claiming the championship until after the protest has been decided.

"Mr. James came here on a Sunday, and arranged for a debate between Oregon City high school and Estacada high school, to be held at Estacada. On the following Monday he cancelled this date, and entered into an arrangement with the Mount Pleasant debating team to debate Estacada, shutting out Oregon City. His pretext was that two students of the Oregon City team had listened to a debate on the same subject at Parkplace. This claim was not well grounded, for all of the members of the Mount Pleasant team had listened to the same debate, and I so informed him. The Estacada team afterwards defeated Mount Pleasant, and then debated an entirely different question last night with the Parkplace team, losing the debate.

### SOLICITING COMMITTEE IS NAMED

Home and Club House to Be Constructed on Lots Recently Purchased Fronting Main and Water.

## FEDERAL BUILDING WILL COST \$75,000

### BILL INTRODUCED IN SENATE TO ERECT STRUCTURE AT OREGON CITY.

United States Senator Chamberlain has introduced a bill in the Senate appropriating \$75,000 for the purchase of a site and the erection of a federal building at Oregon City. At nearly every session of Congress a similar bill has been introduced, sometimes having died in a committee and last session Bourne's bill passed the Senate but was never acted upon in the House.

The Oregon City Commercial Club is planning to back up Senator Chamberlain and will at once enlist the aid of Senator Bourne, and Congressmen Hawley and Lafferty. It is believed that the appropriation can be secured at this session of Congress, provided the local commercial organization will work forcefully to that end, and the fact is recognized that never before has the Oregon congressional delegation had the united support of the Oregon City business men and property owners.

The local postoffice has for some years suffered from lack of adequate quarters and the business has grown to such an extent that a federal building is badly needed here.
